

C Appeals for Nurses

Several states in the nation are asking for additional registered nurses to aid polio victims, and the state of Oregon is no exception. The state health department is appealing for available nurses to serve where needed most was issued last week by Nathan Rubenstein, president of the Lane County Red Cross chapter.

The Lane County chapter's appeal is part of the national plan in the American Red Cross, in cooperation with the National Association for Infantile Paralysis, recruiting nurses for immediate service in the United States where outbreaks of polio are causing a serious shortage. Nurses accepted for duty will have their transportation and an allowance for maintenance paid by the National Foundation, and are asked to serve at least two weeks.

A nurse is permanently employed, we do not wish to take away from her work," Rubenstein said. "But any nurse who conscientiously leave or whose employer is willing to release her to help save polio victims is asked to contact the chapter."

Registered nurses may answer the appeal by contacting the Lane County Red Cross, 43 Eighth Ave., either by telephone or in person.

Of 25 prospective sites, only six are still under consideration. An unconfirmed report was that two board members were in favor of an east side Portland location.

As yet an architect has not been selected from the remaining list of 13 candidates.

Idaho Smelter Out on Strike

WALLACE, Idaho — (AP) — All mines and mills in the Coeur d'Alene mining district remain in operation despite a strike at a smelter in Kellogg.

Sheriff Archie McPhail said the strike called Saturday night at the Bunker Hill smelter has been "very orderly." About 500 workers are on strike.

T. W. Hanson, international representative of the CIO Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers Union, said the strike has not spread to other properties.

The threat of a strike has hung over the whole district since miners authorized their negotiators to call a strike and turned down a contract offer.

A health and welfare program is the principle stumbling block to agreement on a new contract. Operators also oppose a demand for a union shop.

The union has authorized workers to do necessary maintenance work at the Kellogg smelter. The smelter processes much of the lead concentrates mined in the district. However, mines could stockpile metals if they choose while the smelter is struck.

That shows that he can do more than just whittle. He paints, too, specializing in ink drawings on broadcloth. One of these is hanging in the Carnegie Fine Arts Galleries in Pittsburgh.

In addition to all this he was an honor student at Parrish Junior High, and was active in school theatricals.

Tourist Missing After Fire

BOSTON BAR, B.C. — (CP) — The charred body of a man, believed possibly that of an American tourist, has been recovered from the ruins of the Boston Bar Hotel, which was destroyed by fire early Saturday.

Police say the victim may be L. T. Haug of Los Angeles, lone hotel guest still unaccounted for. Thirty-nine others escaped in night attire when flames swept through the 18-room, two-story structure causing damage estimated at \$100,000.

Earlier it was believed all 40 guests had escaped. Some suffered minor injuries in leaps to safety. Boston Bar is 90 air miles northeast of Vancouver in the Fraser River Canyon. Haug is believed to have been traveling by train. He checked in Friday night.

Portlander Works At Forest Office

Mrs. Helen Griffin, Portland, administrative assistant in the division of timber management of the regional Forest Service office, is working at Willamette Forest headquarters in Eugene for the next two weeks.

Her tour of duty here is part of a new plan which gives regional Forest Service workers an opportunity to visit various forests in the region and to gain a better appreciation of the problems of individual forests.

Working under administrative assistant Clyde Quam, Mrs. Griffin will work on a two-day audit of the Cascadia District, in addition to other projects.

One "show me" trip is planned while the regional office worker is here—a tour of Oakridge and Fall Creek to inspect scaling, timber work and other operations.

Two Youths Are Missing

FRANKFURT, Germany — (AP) — American authorities reveal they had received an unconfirmed report that two American youths missing on a bicycle tour of Germany have been arrested by police in the Soviet zone.

The youths, Warren Oelsner, 21, of Oyster Bay, N. Y., and Peter Sellers, 19, Radnor, Pa., were reported by a German to have been picked up in the Soviet zone town of Boitzenburg, near the British-Soviet zonal border.

The German, who came from the Soviet zone, told the British public safety officer in Dortmund that a German policeman in Boitzenburg had informed him of the incident.

Seattle Starts Alaska Loan

SEATTLE — (AP) — A new effort to obtain a \$1 million loan for Alaska has been started in Seattle by J. Gerald Williams, territorial attorney general.

The money would be used to pay \$400,000 in existing territorial warrants plus expected expenditures between now and Feb. 1, proposed expiration date of the loan, Williams said.

An earlier attempt to secure \$1 million fell through and brought the charge from Treasurer Henry Roden that Seattle interests were attempting to force the territory to repeal some taxes which had been enacted by the 1949 Legislature.

Other sources said the loan negotiations collapsed when it was learned that Alaska owed more than the amount represented.

Williams said his negotiations also were with Seattle interests, although he would not name them. He also said he did not want to comment on whether or not he thought prospects were bright.

"We're going to try to raise the money in Seattle," he said. "We think Seattle should help us—that Seattle has a greater responsibility than either Portland or San Francisco."

He said this did not preclude the possibility that efforts to obtain the loan might be made in some other city.

Engineer Positions Open in Civil Service

Federal Civil Service announces examinations for Construction Inspector (general, earthwork, concrete placement, grouting and mixing plant), and Construction Inspector (dredging).

Persons who desire permanent positions will have an opportunity to file for a civil service examination leading to probational appointment with permanent classified civil service status in these positions with the Corps of Engineers, Portland District.

Entrance salary for these positions ranges from \$2974 to \$3727 a year; inspector (dredging) from \$2974 to \$3351 a year.

Applicants will not be required to take a written test, but will be graded on the basis of their experience and training.

Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 62, except that these age limits may be waived for veterans and under certain conditions for war service indefinite employees.

Applications will be received by the Board of U.S. Civil Service Examiners, Corps of Engineers, U.S. Army, 628 Pittcock Block, Portland, 5, until further notice.

SALEM — (AP) — Two Portlanders were killed early Monday when their car left the North Santiam Highway and plunged over a 200-foot cliff six miles east of Idanha, Ore.

The coroner's office identified the traffic victims as Roscoe T. Pierce, about 34 years old, and Anna B. Pierce, about 32, man and wife.

Marion County Coroner Leston W. Howell said the couple was driving a late model Mercury station wagon. Marks on the pavement "indicated they might have had a tire blow-out" while traveling around a curve on the steep road.

Both persons were found several feet from the automobile and appeared to have died instantly.

Landlord Takes All

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Ten families tried to move into a single home at once, and sheriff's deputies began looking for George T. Gray to explain.

They said Gray collected advance rent of \$1000 from the "tenants" before disappearing.

Girl Dies of Shot Wound

JOHN DAY — (AP) — Fourteen-year-old Helen Tennison, who had been a witness in a rape case last week, died in her home Saturday night of a shotgun wound.

Sheriff Oliver Calhoun said the Tennison family had moved here from Burns, where the girl was chief prosecution witness in a rape arraignment. The accused man was held for the grand jury.

Grant County Coroner J. Carl Driskell said the girl was alone in the house. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Tennison, and a younger brother had left to see a circus performance. The parents found the girl and a .410 caliber shotgun at her side.

Deschutes Agent Wins Harvard Scholarship

CORVALLIS — (AP) — Deschutes County Farm Agent Jean Lear has been granted a year's scholarship at Harvard University for advanced study in public administration.

He plans to start work at Harvard this fall.
