Bethel Schools To Institute Insurance Plan

BETHEL — A student accident
insurance plan for all pupils en-
rolling in the upper 6 grades at
Willamette High School will be
encouraged when school opens,
according to Tom Powers, super-
intendent of Bethel School Dis-
trict No. 52.

A flat rate of \$1.25 will be
charged each pupil and will in-
sure them from the time they
leave home until they return each
school day, but will not cover
them in inter-scholastic sports.

The insurance will cover traffic
accidents, injuries received on
school premises, and intra-mural
programs.

Students participating in inter-
scholastic athletics will be re-
quired to take out additional in-
surance.

Students will be insured in
practice or in games between
schools for the following addi-
tional premiums: football, \$5;
basketball, \$2; baseball and
track, \$1.

Premium payments will be in-
cluded in registration fees. The
insurance program will be en-
couraged in elementary schools,
also.

"This is extremely inexpensive
insurance, considering the possi-
bility of accidents occurring
among any group of pupils en-
gaged in so many activities.
The type of insurance now
planned for Bethel students is
comparable to that carried in
Eugene and Springfield schools;
and practically all schools in the
state now encourage students to
take out this form of insurance,"
Powers said.

The plan is recommended by
the school board of District No.
52.
