Tempting Summer Buffet

For a summer buffet, to serve with iced tea or coffee, make appetizing "tulips" out of shrimp and tomatoes. Garnish the tray with "calla lily" sandwiches and radish "roses."

Shrimp Tomato Tulips (8 servings)

Two 5-ounce cans shrimp, drained, 1 cup grated cabbage, 1/2 cup finely diced celery, 1/2 cup minced green pepper, 1 teaspoon grated onion, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 8 tomato slices.

Shred shrimp, reserving 8 for garnish. Add cabbage, celery, green pepper, onion, mayonnaise and lemon juice; mix thoroughly. Chill. Wash tomatoes. Using a sharp knife, cut from center of bottom to stem end petal fashion; hollow out center slightly. Pile stuffing in center of each tomato; garnish with whole shrimp.

Deviled Shrimp (4 servings)

One 5-ounce can shrimp, drained, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 4 tablespoons butter or fortified margarine, 4 tablespoons flour, 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1/4 teaspoon paprika, 2 1/2 cups milk, 3 hard-cooked eggs, sieved, 1 tablespoon minced parsley.

PEACH BLUEBERRY RING SALAD

(Symphony of summer flavors)
 1 package cherry flavored gelatin
 1 3/4 cups boiling water
 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 2 freestone peaches, sliced
 1 cup blueberries or huckleberries
 Salad greens
 Cottage cheese
 Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Chill until it begins to thicken. Put a layer of gelatin in the bottom of mold and add blueberries. Add remaining gelatin and arrange peach slices to form a scallop effect, with pit cavity up. Chill until firm. Unmold on salad greens. Fill center with cottage cheese. Serve with mayonnaise. Serves 6.

Try this for a refreshing salad: Combine equal parts of honey and lemon juice. Beat well and serve over slices of avocado pear and sections of grapefruit on lettuce. Garnish with fresh berries.
