

General Clay Warns Against Sending Aid to Other Nations

Gen. Lucius D. Clay declared Monday that the United States should not expand its aid to other nations, but warned against the flow of aid to nations behind the Iron Curtain.

Clay, who retired last May, said that nations had "joined to restore sanity to the world." This was done, he said, after "unfortunately our hope for the United Nations did not materialize."

However, he said, "We can hope it (the UN) will yet attain the objectives sought."

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Later, Navy Secretary Francis P. Matthews, said the United States has been "compelled reluctantly" by Russia's "dream of world conquest" to adopt its present arms program.

On the way to victory in the war against totalitarianism, Clay told the forum at the French embassy official, said France has a force of 1 million who "mobilized tomorrow" in the fight against Communist aggression.

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Texan Weds Via Phone

FORT WORTH, Texas — (AP) — PFC. Elmer Lee Wright married his Viennese sweetheart, via trans-Atlantic telephone.

He was in Fort Worth and the bride, Leopoldine Anna Brubmuller, was in Wolfshofen, Germany.

The telephone connection was made at 6:15 a.m. CST, and the ceremony ended seven minutes later.

In Wolfshofen, the new Mrs. Wright wept and couldn't talk much to her faraway husband. Her sister informed the Fort Worth wedding party that the joy of the occasion was just too much for Anna.

The bridegroom was joyful, too, in a less emotional way.

"I'm going to try right away to get her over here," he said. "Then we're going to go through this marriage ceremony again, and do it up right—in a church."

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TUC Urges Restraint

LONDON — (AP) — The Trades Union Congress, backbone of the Labor Party, urged the unions in its annual report to show "restraint" in demands for wage increases.

"We have no doubt whatever," said the report, "that perseverance in the effort to improve the efficiency of our industries and increase productivity, and in the meantime restrain an increase in personal incomes, is the only possible policy for the unions to pursue."

"It has enabled us so far to maintain living standards, insure fair shares for all and keep up the volume of full employment."

Copter Saves Mayor's Day

NEW YORK — (AP) — Busy Mayor William O'Dwyer kept a date by helicopter.

He finished a ceremony on Staten Island Monday and was due for a Manhattan meeting in 15 minutes.

The Staten Island ferry could not get him there in time. So he boarded a police department helicopter at a Staten Island field and was whisked across upper New York Bay to the foot of Wall Street in eleven minutes.

A police car then rushed him to nearby City Hall — with two minutes to spare for his date.

Sheep Breeders Elect Texan President

SALT LAKE CITY — (AP) — Leo Richardson of Iran, Texas, was elected president of the American Rambouillet Sheep Breeders Assn.

He was named to succeed W. C. Olsen of Mt. Pleasant, Utah, at the organization's 61st annual meeting, held in conjunction with the national ram sale here.

Sales at the 34th annual sale totaled \$86,840. The first day prices fell sharply from the 1948 average but the total number of transactions rose slightly from previous years.

Man Arraigned On Burglary Charge

Johnnie Frazier, 32, Creswell, was arraigned in District Court Monday on a charge of burglary not in a dwelling. He was arrested by state police who accused him of breaking into the Turt Tavern and taking various personal articles.

He waived statement and requested a preliminary hearing which was set for August 25. He was released on \$1500 bail bond.

Grandma Goes Back to Poker

LONG BEACH, Cal. — (AP) — Take it from Sula Bell Stimson, gambling grandmother of Gardena, glutamic acid is no substitute for poker.

Mrs. Stimson, 49, has been undergoing medical treatment under court order to curb her craving for cards. She had undergone a personality change from a normal housewife to a gambling addict.

Two months ago the treatment was pronounced 40 per cent effective by Dr. Marcus Crahan, county jail physician, and the woman was released to her family. This week she was in court again on the same old charge — passing worthless checks to finance her gambling in nearby Gardena, where poker is legal.

Superior Judge Fred Miller continued the case for a week while he talks it over with Dr. Crahan. It was Crahan who originally suggested glutamic acid might restore the housewife's normal personality.

The gray-haired woman asked the court to "restore the shots" and added that it was due to her own neglect that they hadn't been continued after her release on probation.

Glutamic acid, protein brain food, was given to her by Dr. Crahan "to restore her sense of responsibility." It tends to make up for deficiencies in the cranial system and has been used with some success in cases similar to Mrs. Stimson's.

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Dolls Collected For Toyless Tots

PITTSBURGH — (AP) — Peggy Reiley has a packing problem on her hands with Europe's toyless children in eventual beneficiaries of her efforts.

Miss Reiley, women's editor of the Somerset (Pa.) American, recently launched a campaign to collect dolls to be sent abroad. Nearly 1500 were donated in short order, including 200 shipped to Pittsburgh by Margaret Wooding of St. Catharines, Ontario.

The 29-year-old newspaper woman was informed by customs officials she would have to pay \$14.60 duty on the Canadian dolls.

Miss Wooding said she had been assured the dolls would be shipped duty free and Miss Reiley said she wouldn't pay the money because of the principle involved.

The Somerset editor had a verbal tussle with Mrs. Elaine V. Beadling, customs collector, whom she said greeted her with the comment "I'm glad you finally came to us instead of going to the newspapers."

That situation was ironed out when Mrs. Beadling informed reporters she wasn't "mad" at them although earlier she had shoved from her office a girl reporter who had accompanied Miss Reiley.

Then Sen. Edward Martin (R-Pa.) announced in Washington he had been told the dolls could go through duty free if the donor guaranteed not to sell them in the United States.

That indicated at least a partial victory for Miss Reiley—but one little matter remained. Customs officials said the Canadian dolls must stay in the Pittsburgh customs warehouse until they have been unpacked, tagged, read-dressed and repacked.

"It's going to be a big job," sighed Peggy Reiley. "We are expecting other shipments from Canada and I'm hoping someone in Washington will do something about this silly red tape before then."

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Army Department Aides Sworn In
WASHINGTON — (AP) — Tracy S. Voorhees, who has been Army assistant secretary for occupied areas, was sworn in Monday as undersecretary.

Voorhees will leave immediately for two weeks of conferences with Gen. Douglas MacArthur in Tokyo.

Archibald S. Alexander, of Bernardsville, N.J., was sworn in as assistant Army secretary.

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
