Germany Changed, Local Man States

Germany today isn't the place city limits at least a couple of times.

Mrs. Morris is impressed with the country, too, although the couple (or trio) has been handicapped by lack of an automobile to see the McKenzie and coast areas. She didn't care for New York, though.

"I didn't like so much New York. Too big and so very 'ot," she commented.

The family will be on the West Coast about three weeks, before returning to Heidelberg.

Stevie, who doesn't speak any language yet, will learn French and German before he learns English, his parents have decided. They feel he can pick up English later, but that his very young years are the time for him to learn the other languages.

"All the American kids over there speak German," Morris says, "some of them better than the German kids do."

The mighty cigarette which was currency and open sesame four years ago has decreased in value, Morris reported, because the Germans now have cigarettes of their own. They're still useful as tips and added "inducements," however.

Rubble Cleared
Some cities, such as Munich, are making great strides toward reconstruction—a job which had seemed almost hopeless when American soldiers first saw the city in 1945. The rubble is cleared from the streets now, although the empty shells of many buildings still stand, Morris says.

The individual German is no longer afraid of the occupying powers, Morris says, adding that they even talk back now—an unthinkable thing in the first months after the war.

Mrs. Morris says that the wives of Americans in Germany are not often mistaken for German girls. More often, she points out, the "Frauleins" are mistaken for American girls.

Some things haven't changed a bit, however. The Morris family is sitting in Springfield waiting for a suitcase—the one with most of Mrs. Morris' clothes in it.

Larceny Faces Tax Clerk

OLYMPIA—(U.P.)—A collection clerk in the State Tax Commission was taken into custody here and charged with grand larceny for misappropriating some \$3600 in public funds.

The man, Harold F. Rogers, 41, of Olympia, confessed taking money belonging to the state, but declared that for the past 11 months he has repaid approximately \$1100 in an attempt to make restitution.

The charge against Rogers was filed as a result of investigation by the governor's office, State Tax Commission and Budget Director. The investigation was ordered last May by the governor to find any discrepancies or indications of dishonesty in the handling of public funds.

Rogers is the second state employee to be charged with misappropriating as a result of the governor's investigation. H. D. Graves previously was charged with taking a sum in excess of \$8500.

Rogers has been an employee of the tax commission since Feb. 10, 1936, with the exception of four years with the Army Air Forces, returning to the commission in January, 1946.

H. P. (Dick) Everest, assistant to Governor Langille, said the governor would continue the investigation and would prosecute in any case where there was any indication of dishonesty.

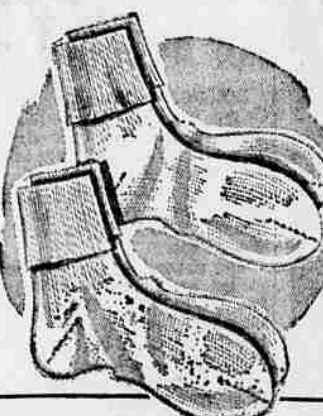

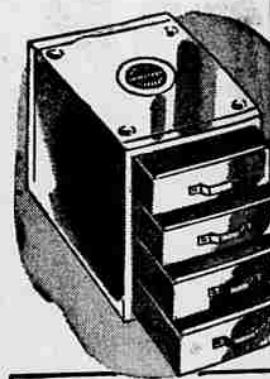
