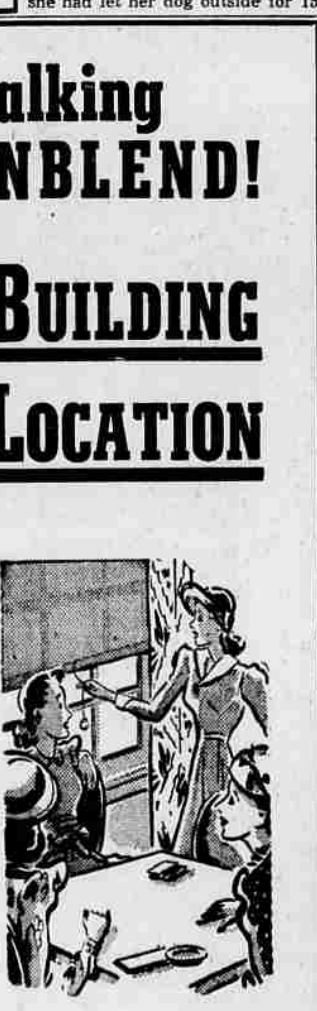

A total of four dogs had been poisoned in the same vicinity, three in the past two days. Three of the dogs were tied or penned in their masters' yards, police said, and only one of them was allowed to run at large.

Police believed that whoever was destroying the pets and endangering children was throwing the poison in the yards directly in front of the dogs. An autopsy is being performed on the Davis' family dog to secure definite evidence of the poisoning and to determine its nature.
