Miss Goodlin Sails Wednesday to Study For Year Abroad

NEW YORK — Members of Smith College's largest post-war junior year in France sailed Wednesday on the SS De Grasse for a year of study in Paris, and they were guests of the French government at a reception given Tuesday afternoon from four to six o'clock for the students and their parents by the Cultural Counselor to the French Embassy, Rene de Messieres, at 934 Fifth Avenue. Miss Joanne Goodlin from Mills College, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Goodlin of Eugene, is one of the group.

The young women in the Junior Year Group represent sixteen states and include, in addition to thirty-two junior-year students at Smith College, six women students from other eastern colleges.

Director of the third post-war group is Miss Jeanne Saleil, associate professor of French at Smith and author of the recently published book, "A house in the Cevennes." She already is in France and will meet the group at Le Havre.

The first six weeks in France will be spent in Grenoble, a university town in the southeast of France, where the students will live with French families and will receive intensive instruction in the French language. Residence during the rest of the year will be at Reid Hall in Paris and the group will study at the Sorbonne, the Ecole du Louvre and the Institut D'Etudes Politiques.

With the exception of the war years, Smith junior year students have been going to Paris to study since 1925 and this year Smith groups will go to Italy, Mexico and Geneva.

In addition to the practical value of a year in France for those who plan to teach French, the year abroad has proved to be an effective way of promoting international understanding.

FRESH PEACH ICE-CREAM

2 eggs
3/4 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup milk
1 cup whipping cream
1 cup mashed ripe peaches

Beat the eggs until lemon colored. Gradually add the sugar and salt, beating until the mixture is of custard-like consistency. Then slowly stir in the milk, cream and mashed peaches. Pour into freezing tray and freeze at fastest speed. After ice cream has frozen about 1/2 inch from the sides of the freezing tray, remove to a chilled bowl and beat with rotary beater until smooth. Return to freezing unit and freeze quickly. After the ice cream has frozen the refrigerator temperature may be lowered to permit the ice cream to mellow.

Shredded cabbage should be cooked in a small amount of water in a covered saucepan for only about eight minutes; if the cabbage is cut in wedge-size pieces it will have to be cooked from 10 to 15 minutes.
