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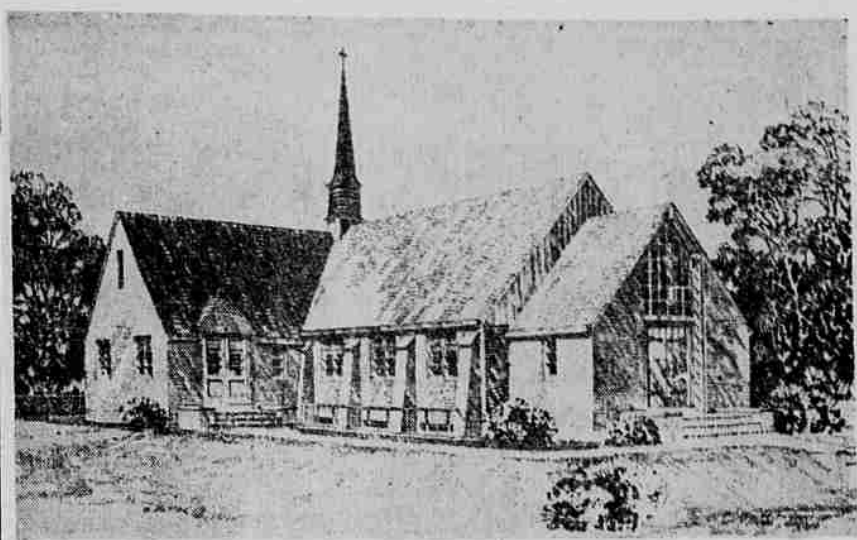
WHAT DID THEY MEAN —

NORWEGIANS MAY START MISSION IN JAPAN

OSLO, Norway — A plan for founding a Norwegian mission field in Japan by missionaries evacuating war-torn China was disclosed here by Tormod Vaagen, secretary-general of the Norwegian China Mission Association.

Vaagen, about to leave by plane for China, said 40 missionaries now in that country are young enough to face the new conditions that a transfer to Japan would mean. He said a definite decision on the project would be forthcoming at a future date from the association's executive committee.

While in China, Vaagen will make evacuation arrangements for various Norwegian missionaries.—The War Cry.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Through the use of books and materials sent to Tokyo by a Louisville church, 200 Japanese children will be taught the Bible and handicraft skills at a vacation Bible school this summer.

Raymond M. Rigdon, educational director of the Crescent Hill Baptist church, says most of the children will be from non-Christian families.

Rigdon believes it is quite unusual for a single church to sponsor a foreign vacation Bible school. He first got the idea through correspondence with Mr. and Mrs. Edwin B. Dozier, missionaries in Tokyo.

"They planned to have the school and I asked if the church could sponsor it and send materials," Rigdon said.

The school will be in a section of Tokyo where Christian missionaries never have operated before.
