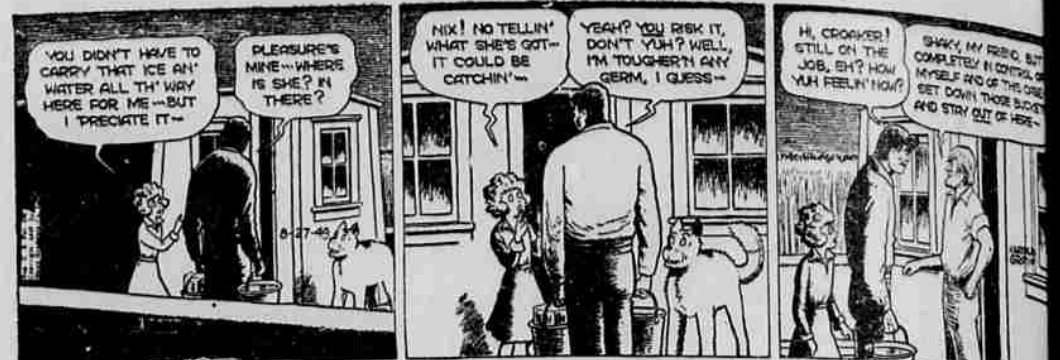
Mrs. Frank Bear
