A new food flavoring, mono sodium glutamate, in crystals which resembles table salt, is on the market. The product which reached our desk bore the trade name "Accent", and is a product of Amino Products, a division of International Minerals and Chemical Corporation, Chicago.

The crystals, slightly salty, have a markedly appetizing flavor, reminiscent of beef tea. They are produced from cereal and vegetable sources, and declared beneficial to health. It is claimed for them that they bring out more natural flavor in meats, poultry, stuffings, fish, soups, chowders, bouillons, gravies, sauces, sandwich fillings, salads, dressings, appetizers, casseroles and creamed dishes.

Prospective users are urged by Accent's makers to try samples which are placed in most stores in the city, testing the flavoring on meats, vegetables, fish or in soups by trying it on half the serving to determine the truth of its claims. It may be added without making necessary any alteration to basic recipes.

Recipe

Peaches in Bloom

4 fresh ripe peaches
 4 tablespoons ground nuts
 3 tablespoons butter
 1½ cups powdered sugar
 1 to 2 tablespoons cream
 ½ teaspoon vanilla
 Red food coloring
 ½ cup coconut
 ½ cup whipping cream

When ready to serve, peel the peaches, cut in halves and remove the pit. Fill the pit cavity with ground nuts, and put the peach together with tooth picks. Make a frosting of the butter, powdered sugar, cream, vanilla and a couple drops of food coloring to daintily tint. If peaches are quite juicy, wipe with paper towel before spreading with the frosting. Sprinkle coconut over frosting and set peach in bed of whipped cream for serving.
