## Action Planned On Beer Sales

Eugene's school board Monday night went on record as disfavoring the sale of beer or other alcoholic liquors within 1000 feet of any school grounds on which school buildings are located.

The policy, established at Monday's regular board meeting, was made to advise local police and the Oregon Liquor Control Commission as to a definite desire of the board in the matter of issuing licenses.

Members of the board announced the action was necessary because of constant applications for licenses from store owners operating adjacent to District No. 4 schools.

The policy may also apply to stores now selling within the 1000 feet — where objections arise from parents.

The liquor commission has indicated that it will comply with wishes of the school board.

**Attendance Told**  
In other action, the board received a report on the first day's attendance in Eugene public schools, from Dean Lobaugh, assistant superintendent of schools. Lobaugh reported 6092 children were enrolled Monday in all public schools, compared with the first-day enrollment of 1948—5798.

He indicated, however, the attendance in District No. 4 schools will increase approximately 5 per cent, as late registrants enroll.

**731 First Graders**  
He said 731 first graders entered school, about 50 below school officials' expectation, but said this number will increase slightly with late comers.

High school enrollment dropped this year, due to withdrawal of Bethel District No. 52 students, who will attend the new Willamette High School beginning September 26.

The board also studied a revised teacher training contract draft, which will be re-submitted to University of Oregon officials for their action.

Under terms of the proposed contract, not officially approved, the district will receive approximately 32 acres of Amazon Flats land to build part of the new Eugene High School and recreation area. The University will also pay an annual monetary amount to the district.

**Would Train Teachers**  
The University will in return receive permission to train approximately 300 student teachers per year in Eugene junior highs and high schools.

Hines reported the city bureau of parks and recreation is interested in using several school auditoriums and gymnasiums during winter months for dancing, basketball, and other activities. He will confer further.
