

Boasts Returning Veterans

Riegel Favored In Golf Action

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 21—Defending Champion Robert "Skeet" Riegel was definitely the favorite as match play got going in the 47th Western Amateur golf tournament Wednesday.

Riegel, who gets his mail at Upper Darby, Pa., but represents the Tulsa, Okla., Country Club, didn't play for the medal in the two 18-hole qualifying rounds completed Tuesday. However, his bonafide practice stretch was better than any of his competitors.

John "Pick" Wagner, 35-year-old auditor from Wilmette, Ill., won the medal with a 135, three over par, on the 6505-yard Bellevue Country Club course.

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Gonzales Hops Into Pro Field For Tidy Sum

NEW YORK, Sept. 20 (AP)—Richard "Pancho" Gonzales turned professional Tuesday, giving up the amateur tennis championship of the United States for a career that will net him at least \$60,000 the first year.

The 21-year-old Mexican-American star flew in from Los Angeles and signed a one-year contract to meet Jack Kramer in a series of 90 to 100 matches covering all of the country's major cities.

"I'm turning pro for one reason," said the former ball boy who learned his tennis on the public courts of Los Angeles. "It's the same reason anybody would turn pro—for the money."

The contract was signed with Bobby Riggs, also a two-time amateur champ who has been a pro for several years. Riggs is promoting the new venture, obviously figuring it will be more profitable than trying to beat Kramer in another professional tour himself.

The pact calls for Gonzales to receive a guarantee of \$60,000 within the next year, or an option of 30 per cent of the gate.

Only one thing was missing from an elaborate press conference held to announce Pancho's entrance into the pro ranks. Riggs had hoped to announce that Frank Parker, U. S. singles champion in 1944 and 1945, also was casting his lot with the play-for-play group.

But Frankie has not yet come to terms. If he does, he will play Pancho Segura of Ecuador, a member of the Kramer-Riggs pro troupe the past two years, in the No. 2 singles match. If they fail to sign Parker, or a reasonable facsimile, Riggs will continue to play.

Bobby stated, however, that he preferred to drop out of the picture and devote his time to promoting the tour.

Gonzales will launch his pro career in Madison Square Garden here Tuesday night, Oct. 25. It was in the same arena that Kramer, fresh from a sweep of the world's major amateur titles, played his first money match on Dec. 28, 1947.

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Eleven Falcons Report for Duty

Elmira In Valley League This Year

ELMIRA, Sept. 21—This may be Elmira's year to come into their own on the gridiron and eleven seasoned boys are the reason.

Coach Jim Mulvihill, now in his third year at the helm has been content up to now to merely build and even this year isn't going out on a limb and predicting great things for the Falcons.

However, he could fill a starting lineup of veterans at nearly every position. The team, though, will be lighter than usual. The heaviest man is a sophomore guard, Gerald Ware. Ware tips the standards a 180. Generally though the team doesn't get out of the 160-pound class.

Elmira will operate from the T-formation again this year, with little, if any variation.

The Falcons have switched allegiance to a new league this year, the Valley circuit. Formerly the Falcons played in the old Tri-County League.

Assisting Mulvihill with the coaching duties is Bill Jones, a graduate of the University of Oregon.

Mulvihill has three lettermen ends back this year and they're all named Mason. Skip, a junior will likely get the starting nod over brother Gene, a sophomore, at left end. Wayne appears to have the right flank nailed down, being a senior with two previous years experience.

At the tackles Rodney Gutman, a senior letterwinner will back and probably handle the left side. Gutman played considerable last year. The right tackle Lyle Melhorn will probably get the starting nod. Melhorn is two-year letterman senior.

There are two letterman guards returning, Pat Hargan and Dave Bales. However both Larry Hargan and Gerald Ware are due for much action.

Dave McKee will probably handle the center post. McKee is a letterman junior.

Handling the important T quarterback role will probably be Rusty Briles, a two-year letterman junior. He'll be understudied by Bill Porter.

The left halfbacking duties will fall to Jerry Christopher or George Brown. Neither are lettermen.

Keith Harper, a senior letterwinner, will take care of the left halfback post, backed up by Jack Hough.

Chuck McKinney, a senior 170-pound letterman will be the fullback and takes care of the line-smashing duties for the Falcons. His understudy will be Bob Harrington.
