Affection Suit Charges Filed

PORTLAND — (AP) — The estranged wife of a Portland restaurateur has asked for \$75,000 for loss of her husband's affections.

Mrs. Grayce Zipper in a circuit court complaint alleged that Margaret R. Kennedy, also known as Margaret Westwood, operator of a wholesale women's apparel business, enticed away Charles Zipper.

Zipper, stockholder in the Whist'n Pig and two other Portland restaurants, and Mrs. Zipper were divorced last year, but the divorce later was set aside on Mrs. Zipper's claim that she was forced by her husband to draft the terms.

Mrs. Westwood divorced her husband, Theodore, last December.

Mrs. Zipper's alienation of affections suit alleges that Mrs. Westwood gave her husband various gifts and as a result, he beat his wife and shot her in the back in 1947, causing her to become paralyzed.

'Babs' Hutton Returns Home

NEW YORK — (AP) — Heiress "Babs" Hutton—a pale, thin woman of 38—has come back to her native land in search of health.

"I am feeling very badly," said Princess Barbara Hutton Troubetzkoy as she arrived on the liner Queen Elizabeth.

The Woolworth 5 and 10 cent store heiress, returning to the United States for the first time in three years, told newsmen she had come for a medical checkup.

She is staying at the Hotel Pierre here, and said she plans to remain in this country for a few months.

She said she expects her fourth husband, Prince Igor Troubetzkoy, to follow her to the United States shortly.

Princess Barbara, down to 92 pounds from her one-time tennis playing average of about 100, denied persistent reports that her present illness was caused by rigid dieting when she was a plump young girl.

She told of undergoing four operations in Europe during the past three years for kidney and intestinal ailments accompanying her illness.

Prisoners Escape Polk County Jail

DALLAS, Ore. — (AP) — Three prisoners escaped the Polk County jail here Tuesday and disappeared in early morning darkness.

Sheriff T. B. Hooker said the men sawed a bar out of the top of their cell, used the bar as a pry to spread others and gain entry to the bull pen. There they pried out a second-story window and jumped to the ground.

The sheriff listed them as: Wesley James Edwards, 40, who had served 1½ years at McNeil Island federal penitentiary and was held here for parole violation; John Theodore Forrester, 45, who was serving a county sentence on drunk and disorderly conduct; and William H. Phillips, 29, held for the grand jury on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses.

The sheriff said four others in the jail did not attempt to flee.

Senate Approves Funds For Schools, Highway

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Senate Appropriations Committee has approved two appropriations for Oregon communities.

They are \$150,000 for construction of public schools in Klamath County for white and Indian children, and \$104,000 to Polk County, for wartime damage to its highways near Camp Adair during the war.

Family Record Made by State

SALEM — (AP) — A valuable historical record, containing the names of every family living in Oregon in 1850, is being prepared by David Duniway, state architect.

It is being compiled from federal census records. The population of Oregon was 13,294 at that time, and was concentrated in the Willamette Valley and on the coast.

Duniway said 2000 copies of the book will be published. When it is finished, he will prepare a similar book for 1890, when the population of the state was 317,704.

He said it has run into some tough problems. The worst is the fact that the 1850 census takers wrote down the family names by ear, instead of having the family heads write them down.

This resulted in some weird spellings. For instance, the pioneer Marion County Abst family was spelled Appis in the census. And the spellings given to French-Canadian names are something to behold, Duniway said.

Duniway said the book would be of great value to historians and to persons who want to trace their families. Every family head will be indexed, both by sound and by spelling.

Little More Like Living

Living in the Carson Hall living room will be a little more like living for University of Oregon co-eds after the settlement in Portland Monday of a month-old strike of glassworkers.

Some units, including the living room, of the new dormitory were not completed because of the lack of glass for window panes. Cardboard and plywood have been used as temporary replacements in some of the windows, while others, such as the living room windows, have been left open.

End of the strike means that eight more girls can move into the partially completed building this week, University officials said. Upstairs rooms without glass have not been occupied. Construction crews are also waiting for glass in bathroom and hall doors of the new dormitory.

In boxing, one immediate result may be the cancellation of the proposed title fight between lightweight champion Freddy Mills and Joey Maxim of the United States.

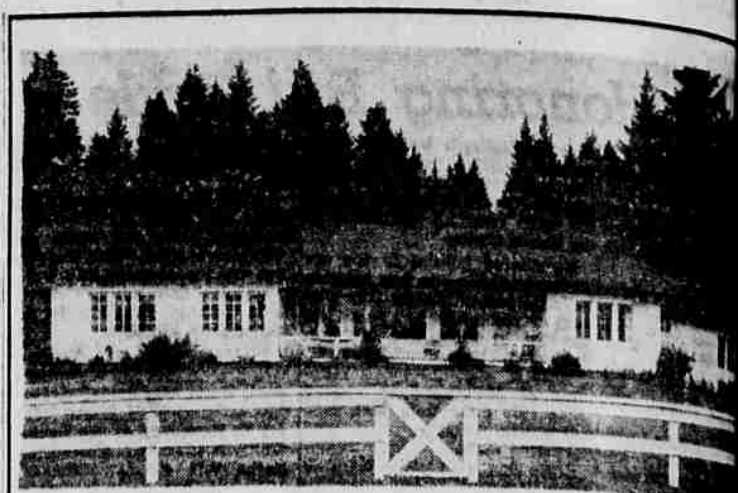

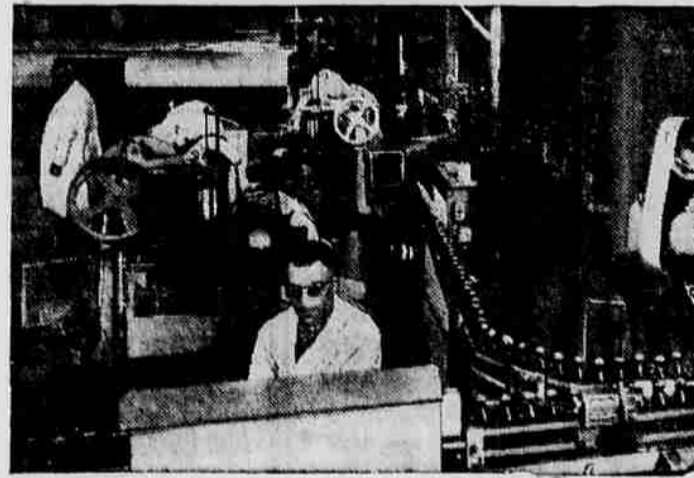
