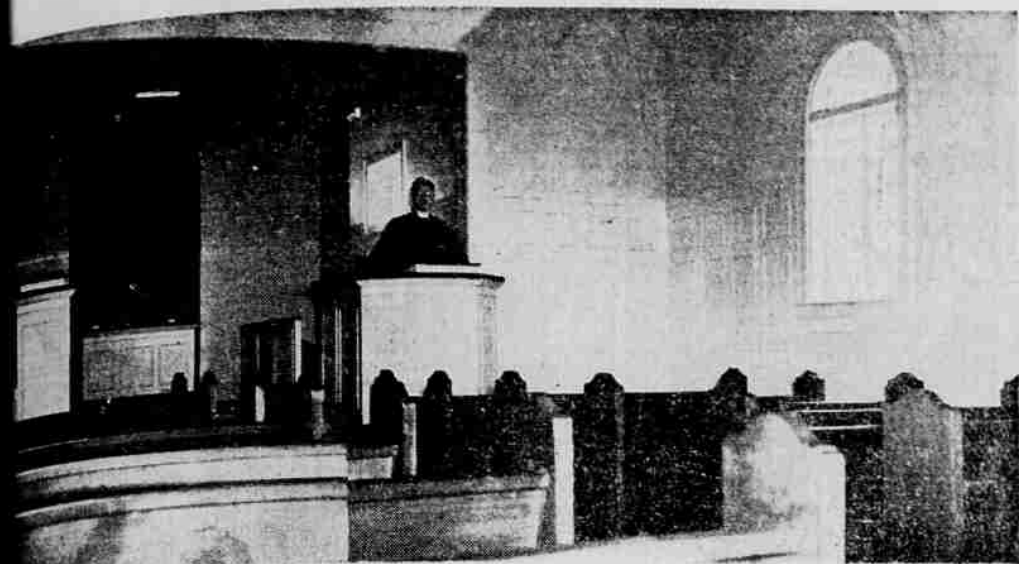

Church of Nazarene Welcomes Pastor, Duane E. Muth

Members of the church board gave addresses of welcome. After the response was made by the new pastor, the Muths were presented with a bouquet of American Beauty roses and a lovely lace dinner cloth.

Rev. Muth comes to Eugene from a successful five year pastorate at Tillamook, Oregon. He received his Master in Theology from Northwest Nazarene College, Nampa, Idaho, in 1941, at which school he also served as Director of Health Education and Assistant Dean of Men.

He is a native of Dickinson, North Dakota. He took his early education there and also received his A.B. degree from the North Dakota College of Education. After graduation he became principal of the high school at Sentinel Butte, N. D. After completing his course in theology at Nampa, Idaho he served as assistant pastor of the San Francisco First Church of the Nazarene for seven months; as pastor at Chico, California for two and one half years; then his Tillamook pastorate.

While in Tillamook, Rev. Muth served as President of the Tillamook County Ministerial Association, and also as President of the Tillamook County Holiness Association. Rev. Muth has always been active in community affairs.

He was chairman of the citizens committee for the promotion of the million dollar Tillamook County Hospital, which is now in the process of being completed. Rev. Muth is quoted as saying: "I am very well pleased with the city of Eugene. I appreciate the privileges and opportunities that are afforded for the spiritual work in this fine city in cooperation with the other churches."

The Nazarene congregation is starting the construction of a new parsonage within a few days for their pastor and family, to be erected at the corner of Jefferson and Sixteenth Streets.

Rev. Muth announced that the regular Nazarene Radio broadcast "Showers of Blessings" will be continued each Sunday morning at 8:15 from station KORE.

Lutheran Hour Goes On ABC Network, Sunday

ST. LOUIS, Mo. —(Special)—Sunday, Sept. 25, Dr. Walter A. Maier, returned to the air to inaugurate the 17th season of Lutheran Hour broadcasting. During his summer absence the Lutheran Hour messages were delivered by the Reverend Doctor John W. Behnken, president of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod.

As the Lutheran Hour launches forward, into its 17th broadcasting season, it has become, "the world's most wide-spread broadcast." Its stations are located in a total of 50 lands. Dr. Maier's messages are translated into 35 different languages, in the spirit of the first Pentecost, which established the ideal that "every man" shall "in his own language" hear "the wonderful works of God."

Dr. Maier announced that beginning Sunday, Oct. 2, his messages will be heard over the American Broadcasting Company network, in addition to the Mutual program on Sunday morning.

The time of the ABC network broadcasts will be: 3:30 p.m. Eastern Standard Time, 3 p.m. Central Standard Time, 2:30 p.m. Mountain Standard Time and 2 p.m. Pacific Standard Time.

Christian Scientist Lectures Monday Eve

Wilmer will speak at this event, and music will be supplied by young Salvation Army musicians from Eugene, Klamath Falls, Medford, Roseburg, Coos Bay, Salem, The Dalles, Pendleton, Astoria, and Portland.

Following the Youth for Christ gathering, the young Salvationists will assist in staging several street meetings in downtown Eugene. A veritable "spiritual bombardment" of the business district is planned.

Sunday two sessions for delegates will be held, with a public meeting at 7:30, at which Major Durham will speak. It is expected that more than 150 young people will be in attendance, together with youth leaders and officers of the Oregon Corps.

The congregation, which first came together for Sunday School classes one year ago, will hear the Rev. R. W. Burtner deliver the communion meditation entitled "The Body of Christ" at 11 a.m. in the River Road School.
