OAKRIDGE—Backed with two years of experience with a self-paying sanitation department, the city dads authorized the purchasing of a \$7500 Leach Packmaster truck from the Howard Cooper Corporation. The deal was made through their representative, Dick Greene, who was present when the truck arrived at Oakridge, to instruct E. M. Rogelstad of the sanitation department, in operating it.

This 15 cubic yard compressed garbage compactor is mounted on a K-B-8 International truck chassis. It is the first of its type to be used on the West Coast.

Admirable features of the compactor: Its all-white exterior, its operations all automatic. A charging door opens in the rear of the truck where garbage is dumped, another automatic device lowers the compressing plate and packs the garbage in a compressed mass, the rear door is then closed and no unsightly and smelly garbage is in evidence.

With this new equipment the driver is able to collect all the garbage in the city before making a trip to the city dump.

The dumping process is operated by the dump truck device, an automatic control lifts the body at an angle to permit the compressed garbage to slide out.

Rogelstad, who operates the truck for the city, is "pleased as punch" with the city's choice of a garbage truck and highly commends its operations.

He even sports an all-white uniform for the job and was disappointed when Bob Frazier, photographer for the Register-Guard, and Thelma Chandler, correspondent for Oakridge, contacted him to take pictures and found him not wearing it.

Oakridge is mighty proud of its sanitation department, whose services have been extended to Willamette City and surrounding areas. All because of an all-white garbage truck.
