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Northwest Groups to Meet To Consider Mining Laws

A conference of mining, lumber, livestock, recreation and wild-life groups has been called by the Bureau of Land Management for Oct. 17 in Spokane, Wash.

These groups will be asked to consider proposed revisions of the United States mining laws, according to Daniel L. Goldy, regional administrator.

"Dissatisfaction with the United States mining laws and complaints about their administration have been addressed to the Bureau of Land Management by members of the mining industry . . . and other interests," Goldy said.

"It is generally recognized that the present laws contain loopholes under which a substantial proportion of the mining claims are filed to the detriment of the surface land and water resources and their users. In recent discussions about these problems with representatives of the mining industry of the Northwest, suggestions were made for a regional conference in which the mining industry could meet with representatives of other users of the public lands to consider together revisions in the mining laws that might be of mutual benefit."

The administrator pointed out that mineral deposits located on federal public lands are subject to disposal under the Mining Law of 1872, the Public Lands Mineral Leasing Law of 1920, as amended, and the Miner Leasing Act for Acquired Lands of 1947.

He said that the system of patenting mineral locations has remained unchanged since 1872 and that the Hoover Commission Task Force on Natural Resources concluded that definite benefits could be obtained through certain revisions, especially in the laws by which title to mineral deposits on public lands is granted or by which the right to remove minerals is obtained.

Representatives of the Idaho, Oregon and Washington State land, game, forestry and mining departments have been invited to attend the conference, as have representatives of the United States Forest Service, Fish and Wildlife Service, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Bureau of Mines, National Park Service, and Geological Survey. The congressional delegations from Idaho, Oregon and Washington have also been invited.
