"THE FOUR FLATS"

Eugene Youth for Christ features on the program Saturday evening, the "Four Flats" male quartet. The quartet will be at the Eugene High School auditorium this time, at 7:45 p.m. The auditorium is located just two blocks off Willamette, on West Seventeenth at Lincoln. Everyone is welcome, especially young people.

The "Four Flats," well known singers from George Fox College (formerly Pacific College), of Newberg, Ore., has just returned from a summer concert tour which took them through 15 states in 42 days.

Classed as decidedly different in the realm of quartet singing, the "Four Flats" have gained a reputation throughout the west. The quartet was organized in January, 1947, and since then have made several tours of the coast, with more than 350 engagements. For the past two years they have won first place in the "Northwest Barbershop Ballad Contest" sponsored annually by the Gleemen of Forest Grove, Ore., and attended by singing groups from all over the Northwest.

This year they won an alternate position in International Barbershop Ballad contest, held in the East. Although they have ranked high in this type of singing, they have been much more in demand by churches and youth rallies. They specialize in interpretative arrangements of Negro spirituals, religious songs and hymns, as well as novelty presentations of barbershop harmonies, all of which will be heard at the rally Saturday.

All members of the quartet are students at the George Fox College. They are Dick Cadd, bass, from Camas, Wash.; Norval Hadley, tenor, from Albany, Ore.; Randall Emery, baritone, from Greenleaf, Idaho; Ronald Creel, lead, from Indianapolis, Ind.

Joe Brill, Eugene YFC director, will be master of ceremonies, and the usual rally staff including Terry Hodges at the piano, Don Lyons and his cornet, and Ray Rexius with his clarinet, will be on hand.

'Christian Kindergarten' Offers Full Course At Assembly of God Church

The Assembly of God Church is offering to parents this year a "Christian Kindergarten," each weekday from 9 to 11:30 a.m.

The kindergarten follows the standard kindergarten curriculum, with a half-hour period of religious training at the opening period.

The children are welcome by Miss Wilma Munger, teacher, with a short session of Christian music, songs and choruses, followed by a prayer and a Bible story. Afterward they have a free play period, in which each child goes to the cupboard and chooses whatever he wishes to play or work upon: puzzles, games, picture books, construction toys, etc.

Then Miss Munger gives them supervised play with which such things as learning to count and recognize letter of the alphabet, manual dexterity, cooperation with others, concentration, etc., are cunningly combined in play form.

Among the graphic arts taught are spatter painting, easel painting and drawing, puzzles, clay modeling, pegboards, bead stringing, etc. There are swings and teeter-totters outdoors in good weather. At mid-morning the children have a snack and a rest period.

About 20 children are enrolled at present, and the pastor of the church, The Rev. Gordon Kampfer, says they could take about ten more; if more than that should enroll, it might be possible to start afternoon classes, also. The charge is the same as for public school kindergarten, \$6.50 per month.

Bishop H- Fuglsand-Damgaard Expounds Lutheran Principles

Scandinavian families from this strongly Lutheran county converged, Friday evening, Sept. 30, on the Bethesda Lutheran Church to hear the titular head of the Danish state church, Dr. Bishop H. Fuglsang-Damgaard, Primate of the Church of Denmark.

The bishop gave, in English and Danish, a vigorous sermon, reiterating the tenets of the Lutheran doctrine and giving the American families assurance that the home church is still carrying on the great principles of the Lutheran beliefs.

Quotations: "The spirit of Christianity knows no compromise... the success of the church lies in the spirit of self-denial and sacrifice in Christ's cause."

Only a small portion of his talk dealt with contemporary affairs, but he expressed the personal greetings of King Frederick the Ninth and Queen Astrid. He described the affection in which the new royal couple are held in Denmark, and told how the people were solidly behind the old king, King Christian the Tenth, in his firm attitude toward the Germans during the war.

In conversation after the service, he expressed his interest in the prominent part that young people play in the church in America.

Mrs. Damgaard participated in the service with an old Danish song, "Der Staar et Slot i Vesterled."

Saturday morning, the Register-Guard reporter found the distinguished guest and his wife walking in the gardens which surround the Bethesda Lutheran Church with Pastor Ingward Olsen and his family. They were in a holiday mood, and the crackling Danish conversation gave this reporter pleasant memories of her childhood in Junction City.

The couple also speak English, however, and they were discussing every feature of their experience in America. This is their first trip.

The bishop was asked about the effect of the war on the Lutheran Church in Europe. He said that in the northern countries church interest is stronger than ever before, but in Germany, the "fortress of the Lutheran faith," a vigorous program of evangelism is taking place to repair war's damage.

Asked about communism, he smiled and said, "Oh, the communists. Always in America the reporters are asking about the communists. We do not know what is on the other side of the iron curtain, but in Denmark the communists are decreasing. At the last election there were 18 communists in the parliament, but after the votes were counted there were only nine. Communism is not strong, in the protestant portion of Europe at least."

Dr. Damgaard has been touring Canada and United States for the past month visiting churches affiliated with the United Evangelical Lutheran Church and the Danish Evangelical Lutheran Church of America. His appearance here Friday evening was the only stop-over between Seattle and San Francisco.

Bishop Fuglsang-Damgaard was born in North Slieve in the year 1890. This section of Denmark was conquered by the Germans in 1944. Like so many others in this old Danish territory he was during the first World War compelled by circumstances to fight for a cause he thoroughly disliked. In 1915-19 he was a prisoner of war in France.

In 1923 he graduated with high honors ("Egredie") from the theological school at the University of Copenhagen, and two years later was chosen instructor in systematic theology at this University.

In 1930 he was appointed Dean of the Cathedral Church in Copenhagen, and in 1934 he was elected bishop of the diocese of Copenhagen whereby he became the Primate of the Church of Denmark. The bishop is the author of a long list of learned as well as devotional books. He has also been very active in international church organizations.

He posed graciously for pictures, and remarked that in Europe most reporters and photographers are men.

When the reporter-photographer was walking to her car, afterward, he asked, "Is this your car? Your own car? In this country everybody we have met, it seems, drives his or her own car."

The party delayed, talking until near train-time. Enroute to the office, the reporter's car was passed by the Rev. Mr. Olsen's car. Rev. Olsen was driving, but beating out a salute on the horn, with a wave and a mile-wide smile, was the bishop himself.

P.S. They caught their train, with nine and one-half seconds to spare.
