Oregon's 1949 Tourist Business Estimated at 110 Million Dollars

SALEM — Oregon's 1949 tourist business brought estimated revenues of 110 million dollars into the Beaver State, the Oregon state highway commission travel information department reported this week.

This figure shows a substantial increase, or 19 per cent, over the 1948 total of 92 million dollars and surpasses the 1947 estimate of 105 million dollars, the previous record. The last prewar travel year of 1941 is credited with a total of 51 million dollars. The 1949 figures are based on a state highway department traffic check
