the team, which is coached
by Vince Lombardi.

The game was played at
the New Coliseum, which

Roe Says He May Not Pitch Again in Series
BROOKLYN, Oct. 8 — (AP) — Preacher Roe, Brooklyn's lean southpaw who shut out the New York Yankees 1-0 Thursday, said he may not be able to pitch again in the World Series.
The 31-year-old Arkansan said he was still trouble by the finger injury suffered when his glove, or right hand, was struck by a sharp line drive during the second game. A nail was ripped off his ring finger.
"I can't bend it and certainly couldn't catch a ball or do any fielding with my hand in this shape," he said.

Charles' Mustache Clipped for Match
SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8 — (AP) — N.B.A. Heavyweight Champion Ezzard Charles will appear in the ring against challenger Pat Valentino next Friday night minus the natty mustache he has sported for the past three years.
The state athletic commission handed down that decree late Friday after managers for the two fighters argued heatedly on state regulations.
In a simultaneous ruling the commission said Valentino wouldn't be allowed to wear a protective bandage over an old eye cut. He has been allowed to wear the bandage in some recent bouts here, but the rules provide that no facial covering can be worn by a fighter if the opposing manager objects.
When Jake Mintz, the champ's manager, objected to the proposed bandage, Jack Andrade, representing Valentino pointedly called attention to a rule requiring that fighters be "clean-shaven."
A man with a mustache isn't clean-shaven, Andrade argued.
"All right, we'll abide by the rule and shave it off," Mintz snapped.
Charles said he thought the whole business was "childish." But he wasted no time removing the mustache.

Alabama Shows Power in Win

NEW YORK, Oct. 8 — (AP) — That Alabama football squad, billed throughout the south as a "team of the future," Saturday shaped up as a pretty good "team of the present."
The Crimson Tide, loaded down with a flock of sophomore backs, displayed amazing scoring potential as it hammered Duquesne, 48 to 8, Friday night before an estimated 15,000 home-town fans.
Jim Burgett, Alabama's speedy fullback, highlighted the game with a 101-yard runback of a kick. It was the longest run turned in by an Alabama back since the Southeastern Conference was organized in 1933.
In an intersectional game at Philadelphia, Villanova gained its fourth straight victory by edging St. Mary's of California, 28 to 20. Steve Romanik, lanky Villanova quarterback, fired two touchdown passes.
Temple turned back Syracuse, 27 to 14, in a mud brawl witnessed by an estimated 20,000 fans at Syracuse. Paul Dubenetzky, unhampered by a driving rainstorm, pitched two touchdown passes, while the Owls picked up their other two tallies on line bucks by Bill Bernardo.
In other major games, Jim Ryan unloaded four touchdown tosses in leading the University of San Francisco to a 38 to 14 victory over Detroit; Hawaii University's razzle-dazzle attack buried Denver under a 27 to 14 count; and Drake whipped South Dakota, 48 to 6.

WAC Basic Course Extended Five Weeks

FORT COLLINS, Colo., Oct. 8 — (AP) — Colorado A. & M. rushed from behind Friday night to defeat Montana University 27-12.
The Aggies were trailing 12-7 in the third period when Fullback Basil Hallmark plunged two yards for a touchdown to put the Aggies ahead for keeps. Then in the final period Frank Fausett broke loose twice to move the Aggies out of reach. He romped 36 yards for one touchdown and ten yards for his final one.
Shortly before the game ended Montana drove to the Aggie three before they were held for downs.
The Aggies drew first blood late in the first period when Hallmark ended a 38-yard drive with a five-yard buck.
Montana struck back shortly before the end of the first half and sent quarterback Tom Kingsford around 100 and for their first score. A 42-yard zigzag set up Fullback Jack O'Laughlin to set up the score.
Montana received the second half kickoff and advanced 85 yards to take the lead. O'Laughlin, who sprinted 29 yards on one play, scored the T-D from two yards out.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8 — (AP) — Shortstop Phil Rizzuto of the New York Yankees equalled a world series record Friday when he just stood at his position all day and didn't get a single chance to field the ball.
Not a ball was hit in his direction, nor did he handle throws from any other players.
The record was established by Dave Bancroft with the 1915 Philadelphia Phillies and since has been equalled by Joe Booley of the 1929 Philadelphia Athletics and Peeewe Reese, Rizzuto's fielding rival, for Brooklyn in the 1947 series.
