

Church Strikes At 'Illiteracy' Of Christians

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8.—The 56th general Episcopalian convention ended here yesterday with the reading of the bishops' pastoral letter in a joint session of the houses of deputies and bishops.

The letter, read by Bishop Oliver J. Hart of Pennsylvania, condemned "religious illiteracy" as a basic weakness of the church and called upon Episcopals to battle for greater Christian education to counter "a world-wide attack on freedom."

The bishops warned that the world had moved from "exaggerated individualism to a demonic collectivism; from an individualistic anarchy to a collectivist tyranny; from a false freedom to a world-wide attack on freedom."

"We have been contaminated by the secular humanism of our time. That is why we call our people to crusade for a better Christian education," the letter added.

In other developments yesterday, the House of Deputies adopted a resolution supporting the traditional separation of the church and state, but approved the releasing of children from school on a voluntary basis for religious education in their own churches.

The deputies also approved a bishops' resolution calling for the internationalization of Jerusalem as the Holy City and elected two priests and four laymen to six-year terms on the national council.

Elected were: The Rev. Dr. William E. Craig of Grand Island, Neb.; Rev. Matthew Warren, Atlanta, Ga.; Harvey V. Adinall of New York; Lawrence N. Horton, Cleveland; James Garfield, Boston, and R. B. Kalde, Houston, Texas.

World Events Commentary

"Piano Portraits," a program of classical music, is scheduled for 8:30 p.m. Wednesdays. Zonda Montgomery, wife of R. K. L. Montgomery, who is a new member of the speech staff, will present the program.

Mrs. Montgomery formerly played on radio programs from Duluth, Minn., both as an organist and pianist. Her program Wednesday will include selections by Debussy and Chopin.

Invitation to Read
Dr. Albury Castell, new head of the university philosophy department, will present a program called "Invitation to Read" Wednesdays at 8:45 p.m.

He said this is planned to "draw your attention to some works of literature and to invite you to read them." His topic for the first program will be the American Heritage, and he will discuss Paine's "Common Sense."

Dr. Castell presented a series similar to this one on station KUOM at the University of Minnesota before coming to Oregon.

Horticultural Meeting Billed

The Oregon State Horticultural Society will hold its 64th annual meeting at the Veterans' Memorial building, Eugene, on Nov. 17 and 18. Complete plans for the event were made at a meeting last week in the office of County Extension Agent O. S. Fletcher.

Lon Hawkins, Santa Clara, president of the state society, called the meeting so that officers of the state group could meet with officers of the Lane County Horticultural Society.

There will be two separate groups convening—those interested in vegetable growing will gather in separate session from those whose principal interest is in berries. Following these meetings, there are scheduled general sessions for the two groups combined. Many expert speakers are scheduled for the conference.

Among those who attended preliminary planning meetings were County Agents O. S. Fletcher and W. B. Parker; Hawkins and C. O. Rawlings, extension horticulturist, Oregon State College, secretary of the state society. Tom Harper, Junction City, third vice-president of the state society and president of Lane County Horticultural Society; Carl Robertson, Eugene, secretary of the Lane group; and Truman Chase, Eugene, who will preside over the vegetable section of the conference.

British War Brides Return From Trip Home to England

NEW YORK.—A plane-lead of 38 British war brides and their 26 off spring returned over the weekend from a five week visit to their native land, most of them irritated by reports they were sorry to come back.

The flying nursery landed at New York International airport late Saturday afternoon and the women and children camped in the lounge before taking off at 8:30 p.m. for the last leg of their trip back to their husbands in California in a chartered plane.

Director and organizer of the vacation trip was Mrs. Betty M. Arietta of (239 south 47th St.) Richmond, Calif., who said the women resented newspaper stories that they preferred England to the United States.

"I don't know where the newspapers got those ideas," she said. "We were certainly glad to be able to visit England which we like, of course. But, at the same time, it is only natural that we are happy to return to our homes in this country with our husbands. We certainly 'love America.'"

She said she had suggested that next year some 500 British war brides hold a convention in California and try to get their husbands to come with them for a visit in England. That idea, she said, was misinterpreted to mean that the British brides were going to try to get their husbands to move to England.

There were two men among the passengers and one, Martin Hight, a chemist who moved from England to Oakland, Calif., two years ago, was in a gloomy mood.

He explained that he had gone to Wellingborough, England to ask his childhood sweetheart, Hazel Currel, to marry him and come to the United States.

"But her mother wouldn't let her get married yet," he said. "She's 19 and her mother won't let her even think about marriage until she's 21. I'll just have to sit and wait."

Four of the women who started the trip from Oakland last Aug. 26 didn't come back. Mrs. Arietta said she didn't know why.

Beginners Get Chance at Trout

PRINEVILLE.—The trout season isn't exactly over for Central Oregon. You can get all the trout you want Sunday at Ochoco Reservoir.

All you have to do is reach down and pick them off the surface. That's because the reservoir and 100 miles of Ochoco Creek and tributaries are to be "poisoned" by the State Game Commission to destroy trash fish.

The trout die, too, but after all fish life is gone, the reservoir will be restocked with trout.

The game commission invited the public to pick up the fish, explaining that the rotenone poison does not make the fish poisonous—it merely paralyzes the fish gills.

Eugene School Census Starts

Census taking activities, an annual chore upon which payments from the state basic school fund are based, opened Monday in the Eugene School District (No. 4).

House to house checks will be made during the next two weeks to determine how many youngsters between the ages of 4 and 19 reside in this district. Last year district No. 4 had a total of 9265 in these age brackets, and the new total is expected to top the 10,000 mark.

This year's check, however, also will take separate account of the number of children under 4 years of age in this district. While these youngsters will not be recognized in computation of basic school fund payments, knowledge of their number will assist the Eugene district in determining further needs for grade school expansion.

The census checks this year will be made in most areas by members of P-TA organizations. Their work will be voluntary, but standard payments will be made to their P-TA groups to aid their treasuries. In a few sections, professional census takers will be hired.

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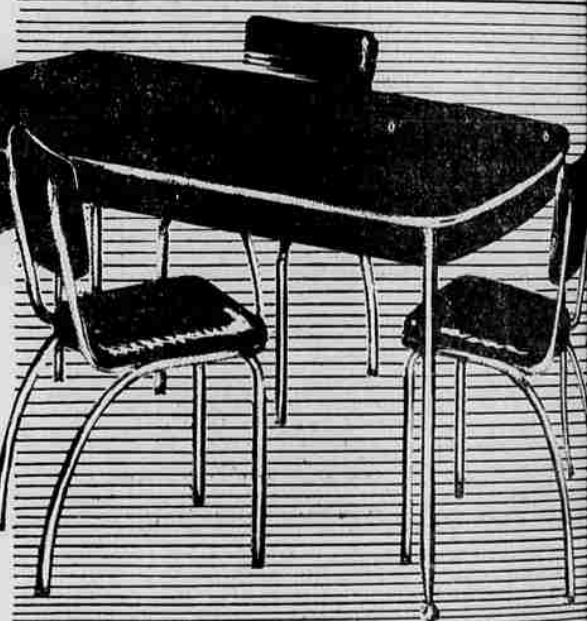
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
