

More Timber Goes on Block

Over eight million board feet of Lane County O & C timber have been scheduled for sale Nov. 8 in Eugene and Portland by the Bureau of Land Management. Total appraisal is \$64,801.25.

Four parcels will be offered at oral auction in Eugene and the remaining stumpage will be sold by sealed bids to be opened in Portland. (Twenty parcels of O & C and eight parcels of public domain timber in Region One will be offered early in November by the BLM totaling over 51 million feet for a total appraisal of \$393,067.)

Appraisals reflect about a 30 per cent drop from BLM appraisals made in March, according to Eugene District Forester Otto C. F. Krueger.

An oral auction is set on 2,045,000 board feet located six miles northwest of Mabel in the Upper Willamette marketing area. Total appraisal is \$14,495.25 on 1,935,000 board feet Douglas fir at \$7.25; 5000 board feet hemlock at

\$2.50; 105,000 board feet Western red cedar at \$2.30 and 4250 lineal feet red cedar poles at five cents.

Another parcel is located eight miles east of Jasper on Hills Creek in the Upper Willamette marketing area and involves 1,500,000 board feet appraisal at \$15,186.75. Included are 1,495,000 board feet of Douglas fir at \$10.15 and 5000 board feet hemlock at \$2.50.

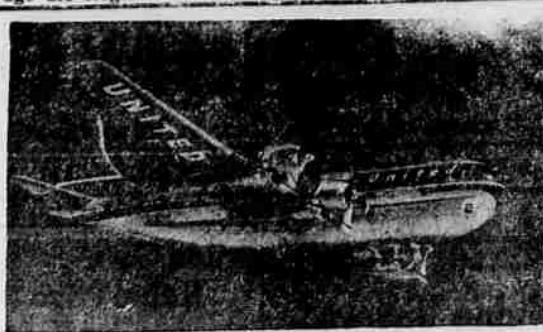
The third parcel is five miles southwest of Dexter in the Upper Willamette marketing area and includes about 1,445,000 board feet appraisal at \$12,479.

Breakdown is as follows: 1,330,000 board feet Douglas fir at \$9.15; 25,000 board feet hemlock at \$2.50; 90,000 board feet Western red cedar at \$2.30 and 800 lineal feet red cedar poles at five cents.

The fourth oral auction is on timber located six miles northwest of Horton in the Siuslaw marketing area and involves about 3,300,000 board feet appraisal at \$22,640.25. The parcel includes \$3,235,000 board feet Douglas fir at \$6.95; 25,000 board feet hemlock at \$2.60 and 40,000 board feet Western red cedar at \$2.30.

The single sealed bid sale involves about 2,655,000 board feet appraisal at \$22,250.50. The parcel is located at Cedar Flats 12 miles east of Springfield in the Upper Willamette marketing area. Breakdown includes 2,450,000 Douglas fir at \$8.65; 15,000 board feet hemlock at \$2.50; 60,000 board feet white fir at \$2.50 and 40,000 board feet Western red cedar at \$2.30.

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NEW GIANT OF THE AIRWAYS will be put into service by United Air Lines in January between San Francisco and Honolulu. It is the Mainliner Stratocruiser, delivered by Boeing Airplane Co. The craft carries 55 passengers at more than 5 miles per minute. The big double-deck 71-ton plane has a wing span of 141 feet.

Wheat Plan Approved

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House Banking Committee has approved legislation permitting the Commodity Credit Corp. to supply wheat to meet United States obligations under the international wheat agreement.

CCC has accumulated stores of wheat under the price support program.

United States obligations now are being served by government purchases from private owners of wheat. Deliveries are at an average 40 cents a bushel subsidy to importing countries.

Instead of such private purchases, the new legislation—already approved by the Senate Banking Committee—would permit the government to use wheat from the Commodity Credit stores.

Posse Finds Lost Hunter

KLAMATH FALLS — (AP) — A sheriff's posse found Frank Hargroves, 20, missing Klamath Falls hunter, alive but suffering from exposure after being missing since Saturday in the Lake of the Woods area.

Spurred by earlier "signal" shots from Hargroves, Sheriff Jack Franey's men reached Hargroves in the Denny Creek region, about seven miles from where the youthful hunter started out from his camp trailing a deer.

Posse members reported Hargroves "all tucked out," his ammunition and matches exhausted. He was discovered sitting in a wooded area at 8:28 a.m.

U of O to Broad Over Station KO

A year-long series of broadcasts called "University Broadcasts" will begin at 4 p.m. Thursday by the University of Oregon and KOAC. The show will be into four sections.

CG Stands By To Aid Vessel

SEATTLE — (AP) — A Coast Guard cutter found the disabled Panamanian freighter Navigator in a howling north Pacific gale, but giant seas made it impossible to take the propellerless vessel in tow.

Coast Guard headquarters here said the cutter Chautauqua located the navigator at 7:30 p.m. (PST) 900 miles west of the Strait of Juan de Fuca.

Gale winds of 60 miles an hour kicked up mountainous seas that prevented the Chautauqua from putting a line aboard the freighter.

"We are standing by until the weather moderates," the cutter radioed.

With the storm obscuring visibility, the Coast Guard weather ship reported making "close contact" with the navigator in darkness through use of radio direction finders, ending a search of several hours.

The 417-foot freighter, of Panamanian registry, was inbound to Vancouver, B. C., from the Orient when she sent out an SOS. She was wallowing helplessly in the huge waves after losing her propeller. A crew of approximately 35 is aboard.

The 225-foot Chautauqua, on regular north Pacific weather patrol, was only 60 miles away and went immediately to the navigator's aid.

Soldier Dazes Hotel Onlookers

DALLAS, Tex. — (AP) — A Camp Hood soldier, Arthur Rudkin kept dozens of onlookers spellbound as he unconcernedly pranced back and forth on a 6-inch ledge outside a second-story window of a downtown hotel.

Hotel workers said the soldier rented a room about 10 p.m. and told a desk clerk that he was going to bed. A few minutes later a hotel porter saw Rudkin on the ledge.

Dozens of people outside and inside the hotel begged him not to jump. He walked back and forth without concern.

Finally, an unidentified man inside the hotel grabbed at Rudkin and he either fell or jumped from the ledge. He grabbed a small pipe support on a sign, but it snapped. His fall was further broken by wires which held a sign advertising the hotel in place.

At Parkland Hospital, doctors said he was uninjured by the 30-foot fall.

Besides the excitement he created, Rudkin had only disturbance of the peace charges against him to show for his 15 minutes on the ledge.

Man Pleads Guilty To Selling Heroin

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — Tears in his eyes, Donald Anderson, 37, a former University of Chicago student, pleaded guilty Monday in Federal court to selling heroin.

Anderson asked Judge Michael J. Roche to be sent to a federal hospital "so I may be of some use to my wife and my seven-month-old twin sons."

Anderson's wife is a Portland, Ore., school teacher. He has been a piano player in a San Francisco nightclub section, the "International Settlement."

Judge Roche deferred action pending receipt of a probationer's report next week.

Anderson, educated in Portland schools, attended Chicago for two years on a scholarship.

He was picked up recently in the old Barbary Coast neighborhood by federal agents posing as heroin customers.
