



National Worker Of Hearing Society Is Speaker Here

Goals of the American Hearing Society, which include prevention of deafness, conservation of hearing, and rehabilitation of the hearing handicapped, were set forth by Miss Ada M. Hill of Washington, D. C., national field worker of the society, in a talk given in Eugene Friday evening. The Eugene chapter met Friday evening in the Wheeler Room of First Congregational Church to hear Miss Hill, and also to hear reports of the recent Spokane conference.

Miss Hill said she had left Washington September 1, to be away until mid-November, working with about twenty of the 123 chapters of the national society. She attended the Pacific Zone Conference in San Diego September 25-29, then flew to Spokane for the conference of the Northwestern Zone. From Eugene she went to San Francisco and Sacramento, before going east to the Mayo Clinic at Rochester, Minn., to confer on hearing problems with its staff.

Miss Hill recommends establishment of training classes for children of pre-school age and their mothers, modeled after the John Tracy Clinic in Los Angeles, so that the small deafened child may learn to speak normally and utilize all residual hearing in preparation for entering the regular schools with children of normal hearing, as soon as possible.
