Officer Reports Two Burglaries

Two downtown burglaries were discovered in Eugene early Wednesday morning by a police officer on routine patrol.

At 2:50 a. m. Officer T. E. Bardgett noticed a door standing open at the rear of the Drug Center, Broadway and Willamette. Another officer was summoned to help close in on the store, but investigation showed that the burglar was not inside.

The door had been jimmied, the officers reported, but a preliminary check with the store manager failed to determine what might be missing from the store stocks.

Thirty minutes after discovery of the first burglary, Bardgett found that a side door at Quackenbush's Hardware Store, 160 E. Broadway, had been forced in a similar manner. This time he stood watch while half a dozen other officers moved into position surrounding the store.

But again it developed that the burglar already had escaped. Again it was not immediately determined what might have been taken from the store.

Decrease Seen In Timber Cut

A third quarter drop in the timber cut and sales in national forests of Washington and Oregon was reported Wednesday by the U. S. Forest Service.

In Eugene, Willamette Forest reported Wednesday that third quarter reports show an increase in receipts from timber cut, but slight decreases in volume and appraisal on timber sold during the period.

For the third quarter ending Sept. 30, Willamette Forest timber cut this year totaled 66,426,000 board feet with a valuation of \$747,079.

Volume Down
Last year's totals for the same period were 69,985,000 board feet valued at \$715,329 — indicating that receipts increased, but volume was down about three and one-half million.

Sales for third quarter 1949 were 75,778,000 board feet valued at \$802,411. Last year's sales totaled 108,377,000 board feet valued at \$2,172,102. One large sale in this quarter last year to Vancouver Plywood for \$1,680,000 accounts for the wide variance between the two years.

Outlook Favorable
Willamette Forest headquarters office reported Wednesday that this quarter's cut is high, with some cutting reports not in because of late-season fire fighting activity. The cutting outlook for Willamette is considered favorable.

Sales for the entire North Pacific Region were down from 615,953,000 board feet in the same quarter of 1948 to 302,805,000 in July-August-September of this year. Value was \$8,556,610 for the period last year compared with only \$2,254,063 this year.

Timber Cut Down
The timber cut in the 19 forests slid from 800,377,000 a year ago to 452,494,000.

Big sales in the Chelan Forest of Washington boosted the total in that state above Oregon for the first time in recent years. Sales in Washington were 187,-

ROTC Ranks Show Increase

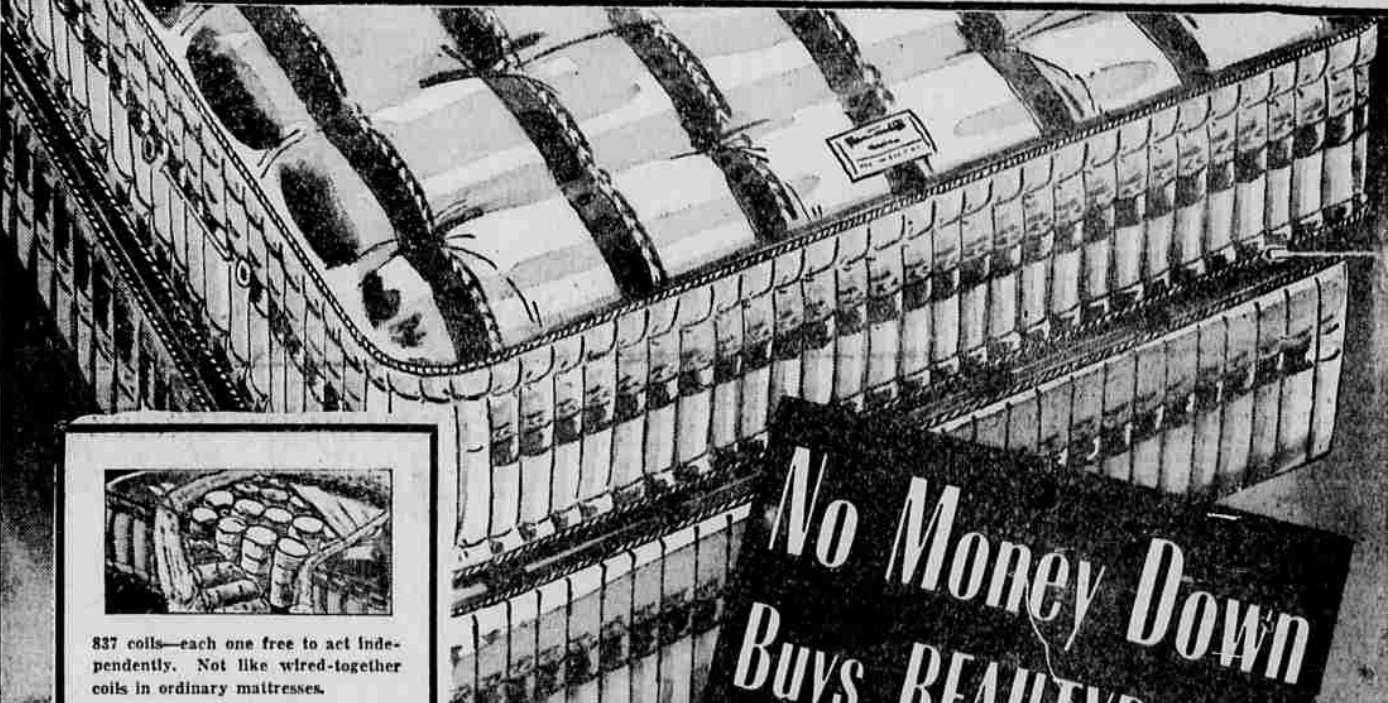
Fifty-eight more men are enrolled in the ROTC program at the University this year than in 1948, Col. Frank R. Maerdian, head of the military science department, has announced.

A total of 1042 are enrolled in the program this year. Of these, 64 are in the first year advanced course and 69 are seniors taking the second year advanced course. There were 56 second-year students last year.

This is how the enrollment stood at the close of registration Oct. 8:

Freshmen, 308 in the army, and 278 in the air force; sophomores, 159 in the air force, 90 in the transportation corps, and 74 in the infantry; juniors, 33 in the air force, 16 in the transportation corps, and 15 in the infantry; seniors, 29 in the air force, 22 in the infantry, and 18 in the transportation corps.

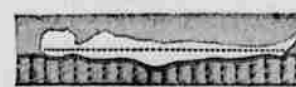
The only class to drop in the enrollment from last year was the junior (first year advanced) class, who had 64 this year as compared to 75 last year.
