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District 19 Sees Classroom Lack

SPRINGFIELD — Superintendent of Schools F. H. Silke Thursday said District 19 will probably have to double shift 1550 grade school students next year because of a classroom shortage.

Silke said the district was now short 10 classrooms and would be short 30 rooms next year. He estimated a shortage of 76 rooms by 1954.

The superintendent said he presented this week a complete report of school building needs to the school board. Silke said the board is aware of the situation but wants the people to realize the need for new construction.

District 19 is not poor, Silke said. Although its bonding capacity has been cut in half by the consolidation of the grade and high school district, Silke added, the district is still a long way from reaching its bonding limit.

The school board this week carried out the following actions:
1—Authorized call on bids for expanding high school boilers.
2—Authorized call on bids for construction of 800 additional seats in the gymnasium. Bids will be opened Oct. 31.
3—Authorized the hiring of an additional teacher at Goshen.
4—Authorized the hiring of a music teacher to teach at both Maple and Brattain schools.

Tillamook Burn Re-Planting Due

FOREST GROVE —(AP)— Hand planting of the first trees in the state's \$10,500,000 reforestation program for the Tillamook burn will start Nov. 1.

A 24-man crew, made up of state forestry personnel, will handle the work. Northwest District Warden Edward Schroeder said this week.

The first contract for snag falling, a preparatory phase of the reforestation, has been let to McCracken Brothers Logging Co., Seaside. It covers an area about a mile and a half long. A state crew, operating seven power saws, also will aid in the cleanup, working from the Glenwood Mill, west toward Owl Camp.

The planting crew will work south of the Owl on some 2000 acres along the Wilson River Highway.

A bit of side work necessitated by the huge reforestation program, Schroeder said, is construction of a 10-room office building at district headquarters on Gales Creek. Records on the 10 to 15-year program will be kept there.

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Captain Joins Recruiting Staff

Capt. M. R. Harris, AAF, has joined the staff of the Eugene Army and Air Force Recruiting Main Station as public information officer.

The Air Force officer comes to Eugene from a recent tour of duty in the Philippines, where he served as aircraft maintenance officer with the field maintenance section at Clark Field, about 60 miles north of Manila.

He enlisted as a private in 1940 and received his commission in 1943 from Yale University. During the war years he was with the training command and in 1945 participated in the educational demonstration program which demonstrated Army and Air Force teaching techniques in various sections of the country.

During this time he visited Eugene twice, appearing at University High School both times, and later chose this city as his recruiting duty preference.

Before going overseas, he served at Wright Field in Dayton, Ohio, distributing surplus property to educational institutions.

His home town is Lincoln, Neb., but his wife and two-and-one-half year old daughter are staying in Eugene with him at 1880 Ferry St.
