# USC Upsets Bears 21-14

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 20—(AP)—A gang of super football players from Southern California knocked California out of the unbeaten ranks Saturday with a stunning 21 to 14 victory over the nation's number one team.

Led by a one-man gang in the person of Halfback Frank Gifford, the Trojans came roaring from behind a 0-14 halftime deficit to hand the Bears their first licking in 38 regular games. The triumph made the Trojans prohibitive favorites to represent the west in the Rose Bowl New Year's Day.

In the roughest and toughest football game even seen in Memorial Stadium the powerful Trojan line, backed by a great star in Pat Cannamela, pushed the vaunted California forwards all over the field and scored a victory that was much more decisive than the score indicated.

However, it was the offensive threat of Gifford, a throw-back to football players of the pre-platoon

period, and the next time California got the ball, the Trojans were so fired up they pushed Cal back 20 yards in three plays. And when the Bears kicked out Halfback John Williams, a thorn in the side of the Cal club all day, returned the ball 15 yards to the 22.

In seven plays the Trojans powered over the winning counter with Leon Sellers ploughing over tackle from the three.

The Trojans got into trouble in the first period as they were penalized twice for roughing, one of these setting up a California touchdown. They were piling on and Fullback Johnny Olzewski was injured on the first play of the game. He was removed but came in later to help with the two-touchdown drive.

However, Olzewski was injured again after three minutes of the second half and was sidelined for good.

### Burkhart-to-Barker Pass Combo Sparks Cougar Triumph; State Offense Bogs in Second Half

BELL FIELD, Corvallis, Oct. 20.—A junior end, Ed Barker, teamed up with sophomore quarterback Bob Burkhart here Saturday afternoon to spearhead Washington State to a 26-13 triumph over the deflated Oregon State gridders. The mild upset staged by the Cougars put the kiss of death on an Beaver Rose Bowl hopes, as this was the second PCC loss in a row for OSC.

The WSC eleven broke the contest wide open in the third period for two quick touchdowns after a 13-13 standoff at halftime. This is the same Cougar club, which Coach Forest Evashevski has been quietly building in the Palouse Hills, which hosts Oregon next weekend. If this performance is any indication, the Webfoots are due to suffer some more brutal lumps.

Oregon's State's defeat can be summed in four statements: (1) Burkhart to Barker, a passing combination which clicked on seven aeriels for 217 yards and two touchdowns; (2) OSC's lack of a passing offense; (3) a likewise weak passing defense by Kip Taylor's sagging legions; and (4) no second half punch by the Beavers.

MEMORIAL COLISEUM, Los Angeles, Oct. 20.—Oregon State's only thing that has kept the Webfoots in the stadium this season, faltered until the final quarter Saturday afternoon as the so-called crippled Bruins of the team smashed their way to a 41-0 victory over Casanova's team.

Each Red Sanders' single-wing Bruins smashed off the ball after the passing of sophomore Paul Narleski, Ted Narleski and Johnny Florence kept the Oregon State offense so loose they had little trouble scoring three times in 11 minutes of the second quarter.

At 14:45, the smallest crowd ever to see an Oregon game in this vast stadium, watched the brilliant UCLA scoring plays in this series and reasonably fine California temperature.

The loss was the third straight Oregon defeat by an adding-up total—34-6 against COP, 63-6 against Washington, and six-touchdown parade—and it was the first time the team has been held scoreless in the past 11 games. Not Oregon lost 14-0 to Idaho at Moscow in the fourth game of the season had the Webfoots been held scoreless. For Coach Len Gerson it was his second loss in three trips to the Coliseum to the Bruins. His Santa Clara team lost 33-7 in 1946 and won in 1949.

instead of the anticipated and prepared-for 4-4-3-1 defense.

Sanders used 45 players, everyone on the squad except for four men who were not suited up.

Oregon was prepared for the UCLA offense, with the optional pass-runs off tackles still unstopable.

Sanders thought the defense was the best of the season, and the offense sharper than at any time since the Texas Aggies tilt. He thought Oregon had a good passing team and the seven-man line gave the Bruins trouble early in the game.

Oregon failed to show any offensive punch after Ted Anderson returned the opening kickoff ten yards to the 24. A fourth-down fumbling-kicker penalty gave the Webfoots a first down on the Oregon 37—but a kick was necessary from the 41. The Bruins roared to four first downs to the Oregon 22 the first time they gained possession, but Oregon stopped the attack on the 13.

The Webfoots moved to two first downs of their own to the Oregon 38, but on fourth down and three to go, Shaw elected to run, and UCLA took over on the Oregon 46.

Two plays lost 17 yards and then Cameron passed to O'Garra and the dusky end took the pass just as he was tackled by Jerry Mock—but lateraled to Luther Keyes on the Oregon 41 and the Bruin scampered to the Oregon 21 just before the opening period ended.

★ Oregon football needs more Ray Karnofski!

We've been watching Oregon football practice almost every night during the Monday-Tuesday-Wednesday scrimmage weeks since September, and you can't help but notice the guys who really want to play football; you can't help but notice the guys who want to play football only on Saturday afternoons.

When Karnofski suffered a painful dislocated elbow in the Arizona game, it would have been curtains for most college gridmen—but not Ray. . . . The 180-pound defensive fullback from Longview is a senior and he wants to play out the string. . . .

During the first week of the injury he was unable to sleep and what cat-naps he was able to get came while reclining in a chair. . . . He has spent hours under a heat lamp and Trainer Bob Officer has massaged the elbow and arm and spent considerable time with Ray—because he wants to play. . . . Right now he is carrying weights that aid in breaking down the adhesions to permit him to straighten the arm. He started with a five-pound weight and he is now up to 12 pounds. . . .

★ Uncle Sam is unpredictable. Look at the case of Ralph Carr, Oregon State's No. 1 offensive right halfback and safety man. . . . The Beaver back, and a very important member of OSC's fine ball club, needed only four hours to graduate—in January. . . . But last week he was called into the service. . . . This was the second game in a row in which Oregon State "folded" in the final two periods. Last weekend, USC overcame a 14-0 deficit to win 16-14. Saturday the Cougars took over Bell Field lock, stock and barrel during the closing half.

The Beavers started out strong and ran up a 6-0 lead with 7:15 left in the first quarter. Halfback Dave Mann, who again looked great, and Fullback Sam Baker did all the carrying on this 59-yard march which took eight plays.

Mann tallied the touchdown when he wheeled outside right tackle, fought off four tacklers and romped into the end zone standing up on a 13-yard sprint. Jim Cordial's conversion attempt was wide.

The Cougars on one lightning-like play tied the score with only two minutes left in the period. From his own 43, Burkhart faded back on a buck-lateral pass play and fired to glue-fingered Barker. The agile end took the ball behind the OSC secondary on the Beaver 36 and streaked all the way on a 67-yard scoring play. Bud Roffler also missed the extra-point try and the quarter ended in a 6-6 deadlock.

Cub Houck's interception of a Burkhart screen pass on the WSC 14 set up Oregon State's second and final touchdown. Five plays later, the other Negro halfback Bill Anderson took a reverse from Baker and stormed over from the three. Cordial's conversion, with 8:55 left in the half, put OSC on top 13-6.

The surprising Cougars came right back on a 67-yard march to tie the count. A Burkhart-to-Barker pass for 10 yards started the ball rolling. Roffler then reeled off a 21 yard gain on an end sweep behind beautiful three-man interference.

Byron Bailey, Ray Hobbs, and Roffler alternated in carrying to the Oregon State 12. The Beavers seemed out of trouble when Ken Storey dumped Bailey for an eight-yard loss back to the 20. But Roffler, again following wicked blocking, took off around right end, cut to the sidelines and slithered across for the tally. Roffler added the conversion to make it 13-13 with 3:40 left in the half.

Oregon State then made its last threatening march of the afternoon with Mann, Anderson, and Baker powering to the Cougar three. On the last play of the half, WSC's 60-minute wingman Don Steinbrunner threw Baker for a four-yard loss, and the intermission gun ended the drive with a 13-13 score.

The Cougars weren't long in taking command in the third period. Four minutes into the quarter, Burkhart and Barker again teamed up—this time on a 56-yard scoring pass play. It was the same buck-lateral pass play with Barker hauling in the oval on the Oregon State 34 and romping untouched for six more points. Roffler booted the bonus marker for a 20-13 bulge.

The next time Washington State got the ball, Evashevski's charges boomed and battered their way 41 yards in nine plays for the clincher. Burkhart threw to Steinbrunner and Barker for 14 and 10 yards respectively to put the ball on the OSC 20.

Then sophomore fullback Jim Head proceeded to make a shambles of OSC's reputed stiff defense. He barreled over center to the nine, skirted right end to the four and after Roffler's two-yard advance, powered up the middle from two yards out for the touchdown.

That ended the day's scoring but twice in the fourth quarter WSC came close to six-point territory. One drive was halted by a fumble on the Beaver nine. The other drive fizzled when Roffler missed on a field goal attempt from the 12.

During this Cougar onslaught in the last half, the bedraggled Beavers never got out of their own territory. And the lack of a passing attack more than killed off victory chances.

Drake Pitches Rice To Win Over Mustangs

DALLAS, Oct. 20.—(AP)—A slashing Rice football team, showing even the great Fred Benner something brilliant in a passing game, soundly trounced Southern Methodist University Saturday, 28-7.

It was Dan Drake who stole the passing magic of Benner, conqueror of Notre Dame a week ago, and routed the Mustangs. He threw three touchdown aeriels to sew up the game for the Owls. It was considered an upset in many quarters—certainly the size of the margin was unexpected.
