General MacArthur set the keynote with an address attacking practically everything the administration is doing at home and abroad. A lot of delegates cheered, and then refused to pass a resolution saying the cheers didn't mean approval of attacks on the President of the United States.

Then they booed the name of Secretary of State Acheson, and demanded ouster of the present corps of State Department leaders.

They passed a resolution supporting the "MacArthur plan" for all-out war against the Communists in the Korea area, thereby incidentally condemning the administration's desire to first create the situation in which the current truce negotiations could take place. The hold of World War II veterans on the Legion was extended by the election as national commander of Donald R. Wilson of Clarksburg, W. Va., to succeed his contemporary, Earl Coe, Jr., of Georgia.

Significant seemed to be the fact that Wilson is a member of the law firm of Louis Johnson, highly controversial former secretary of defense who was finally ousted by President Truman.

The Legion has, of course, been in politics for many years. It has launched a good many important political careers, but mostly through local movements gradually expanding. Seldom before has it taken such a broad general stand in the national political picture.

A study of the attendance lists would be necessary to determine just how much of the expressed attitude at Miami was due to location of the meeting. It is quite possible that the actions of the convention will prove no more binding on the votes of individual members throughout the country than have some of the political pronouncements of labor leaders among their union constituencies.

School Census Underway Here

District 4 Counts Children Under 19

A census of all children 19 years and younger is underway in Eugene School District 4, according to Dean Lobough, assistant superintendent of schools.

Scheduled to be through by Nov. 2, the census takers will count any child whose parents live in the district, whether the child does or not.

Eugene PTA groups are doing the counting. Although several days are being utilized, the census is being taken as of Oct. 25. State law, which requires that it be done the latter half of October.

Questions asked include the child's name and age, and the parents' names and addresses.

State law requires only that children from four years through 19 years of age be counted, but those younger are also included in the District 4 count to provide an indication of future population growth.

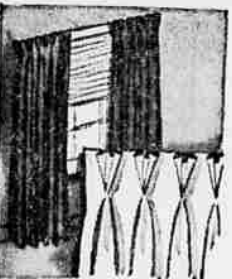

High Offer Timber Sale

Over 9,455,000 board feet of wood and 3190 lineal feet of red poles were sold at the O and N tracts at the Eugene Timber Sale Thursday, one tract being 7,615,000 board feet redwood.

\$44 was received for the tract, so it may be sold at a profit. The price within 90 days of the sale will remain at current levels.

Another 400,000 board feet of wood from the Fall Lumber Co. was the highest offer for any of the timber.

Four other tracts brought bids ranging from \$27.50 a thousand feet to \$38.50 per thousand feet.

Thursday sale brings the timber sold in the Eugene area this year to 81,105,000. Dealers are expected to bring in over 100,000,000 board feet this year.
