

Yanks to Remain On Korean Soil Following Truce

SOMEWHERE IN KOREA — (AP) — Gen. J. Lawton Collins, U.S. Army chief of staff, said Monday Allied forces "will have to stay in Korea for some time if a cease-fire is arranged."

Collins told newsmen it would "not be practical" to pull Allied troops out of Korea immediately if agreement on an armistice is reached at the Panmunjom negotiations.

He said the South Korean army "needs our help for some time to come."

"We want to get our men home as soon as possible, but it would not be done immediately."

In Tokyo, Mrs. Anna Rosenberg, assistant secretary of defense in charge of manpower, told a news conference that 12,000 to 15,000 U. S. combat troops will be brought out of Korea by the end of next month under a new point - rotation formula.

She said Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force men can go home if they have accumulated 27 points and if their replacements are on hand. She emphasized that the policy applied to combat troops, not rear echelon men.

This is how points are figured:

1. Four points monthly to men in the combat zone and at division headquarters.

2. Two points monthly to men on behind-the-lines duty and at corps headquarters.

3. One and one-half points monthly to single men in Japan since July, 1950, and to all men, single or married, on Okinawa, Guam and in the Philippines.

4. One point monthly to married men in Japan whose dependents are in Japan.

Point credit is given wounded men during hospitalization and others for time spent in confirmed prisoner-of-war or missing-in-action status.

Mrs. Rosenberg said national guardsmen promised discharge within two years would start going home after 16 or 17 months duty as individuals, not as units.

The assistant secretary headed for home Monday after a seven-day tour of Korea and Japan. She said she has a long list of soldiers' recommendations to improve conditions.

Collins said the U. S. Eighth Army has "marvellous fighting quality" despite rotation.

He asserted rotation is "going very well" and "we are doing everything we can to get combat veterans of the last winter campaign out of Korea before another winter sets in." Mrs. Rosenberg gave frontline troops the same assurance earlier.

Collins said winter clothing and equipment has been distributed to men of the Eighth Army, adding: "If we do have to fight another winter campaign we will be in much better condition than the Chinese and North Koreans."

The chief of staff said he noted great improvement in the fighting ability of the South Korean army over what he saw on his last visit in January.

"It is most gratifying to see the ROK (Republic of Korea) army learning how to fight on its own," he said. "We are beginning to recognize their able young leaders who gained their spurs in action."

Collins was accompanied on his two-day frontline tour by Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, supreme Allied commander, and Gen. James A. Van Fleet, Eighth Army commander. Collins and Ridgway flew back to Tokyo Monday night.

'Dead' Veteran Clings to Life After 26 Days

LONG BEACH, Calif. — (AP) — Melvin Eugene Hewitt, 27-year-old Navy veteran, clung to life Monday, 26 days after doctors saved him from death by massaging his heart back into action with their fingers.

Hewitt, who was "dead" for 15 minutes before his heart started beating again, was reported still in "critical" condition at Long Beach Veterans Hospital.

Doctors repeated their earlier opinion that he might never regain consciousness because his brain may have been permanently damaged by lack of oxygen during the time he was "dead."

The Navy veteran was injured during a fight outside a bar Oct. 3. He was pronounced dead on arrival at a hospital, but doctors cut open his chest and massaged his heart with their fingers until it started beating.

Church Group Opposes Clark

SALEM — (AP) — The East Willamette Assn., of Congregational Churches opposes President Truman's plan to send an ambassador to the Vatican.

The association, holding its annual meeting here Sunday, voted 34 to 14 to ask the President to reconsider. The resolution says such an appointment is in violation of the American principle of separation of church and state.

It also asked Senators Wayne Morse and Guy Cordon to vote against confirmation of any person who is appointed to the job. President Truman said he would give the appointment to Gen. Mark Clark.

The association includes delegates from Willamette Valley and Southern Oregon churches.

The Rev. Robert Bulkley, Corvallis, was chosen as the new moderator. The new assistant moderator is Carl Merner, Eugene.

The Rev. Wesley Nicholson, Eugene, spoke about his trip to Switzerland last summer as a delegate to the central committee of the World Council of Churches.
