

Hines Invited To Washington

School Superintendent
To Attend Conference

Clarence Hines, superintendent of Eugene schools, will attend a top-level educators' meeting in New York Dec. 2, under approval given by the school board Monday night.

Hines was one of 15 educators invited to be guests of the National Citizens' Commission for the Public Schools at a meeting of its curriculum committee. Expenses will be paid by the commission.

Hines said he expected he would be asked about the work of the lay advisory committee which studied Eugene curriculum problems for a year under the chairmanship of Mrs. C. A. Barnes. He pointed out the work of the committee had gained national recognition.

The New York meeting, Hines said he understood, will plan a commission report on curriculum problems. Mrs. Agnes Meyer, wife of the publisher of the Washington Post, is chairman of the curriculum committee. Roy E. Larsen, president of Time, Inc., is chairman of the commission.

The invitation to Eugene's school superintendent was wired Hines by Henry Toy, Jr., director of the Commission.

Failing to Stop Brings Trial

Creswell Man
Denies Guilt

Art Harper, 44, of Creswell was arraigned in district court Tuesday on a charge of failing to stop at the scene of an accident. He entered a plea of not guilty and trial was set for Dec. 17.

In other district court proceedings, John Lynn Bingham, 28, of Lowell entered a plea of guilty to charges of carrying a concealed weapon. He is to be sentenced at 1:30 Tuesday.

Richard Atwell, 26, of Dexter was charged with being a fugitive from justice. Bail was fixed at \$500 and Atwell was committed to the county jail. According to court records, Atwell is being held in connection with a warrant from the Sheriff of Flathead County, Montana.

Frederick Patrick O'Hara, 64, of Bly, was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail for stealing waste from a railroad car. O'Hara admitted he took the packing from around the journal box on a boxcar to use in building a fire.

Two Charges Bring Penalty

A Veneta man Tuesday in Springfield Municipal Court pleaded guilty and not guilty on charges of being drunk Monday afternoon.

Floyd M. Kendall, 51, was arrested at 7th and Main Sts. at 1 p.m. Springfield police arrested him on a citizen's complaint for driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor. Kendall pleaded guilty in court to the charge and Municipal Judge William D. Bollman fined him \$200 and ordered his license suspended 90 days.

Sgt. Merrill A. Parke also arrested Kendall Monday at the same time for being drunk in a public place. Parke alleged the driver forcibly resisted arrest and was abusive. After pleading guilty to the first charge, Kendall pleaded not guilty to the second one. He was fined \$20 and given 10 days' suspended sentence.

Prineville Sheriff Seeks Beneficiary

PRINEVILLE — (P) — The sheriff's office here continued Tuesday to search for Miss Hazel Hays, beneficiary of the estate of the late Patsey D. Hayes, her uncle. He died last week leaving his money to her. But Sheriff O. C. Calhoun has been unable to locate the woman.

She may have been in the Medford area and may have married a forest fire "smoke jumper," Calhoun said.

Police Book First Juvenile

A 16-year-old boy was arrested by Eugene police Monday night when he was discovered pushing a stolen motorcycle along a west-side residential street.

When detention home officials informed police they'd rather not be responsible for the youth, he was lodged in the new city jail, becoming the first occupant of the juvenile detention room there.

Firemen Hold Benefit Dance

Springfield Volunteer Firemen will hold a dance from 9 to 12 p.m., Friday, Nov. 30 in Springfield Memorial Bldg.

All Springfield city firemen, whether regulars or volunteers, belong to the organization. Proceeds will benefit the Volunteers' general fund. Tickets, at \$1 each, including tax, are on sale at Kelly's Hardware, Baxter and Henning's and at the city fire hall.

The fund is used to purchase equipment for public use, and to improve facilities at the fire station. Firemen have pointed out that a movie projector bought under the fund last year has been in operation 107 hours and has projected many types of films to 10,328 persons to date.

These films have been shown to church groups, youth, civic and service clubs, firemen, nurses, aids, fire prevention organizations, Civil Defense, first aid, and other groups. Through the fund, the firemen have purchased a resuscitator, maintained its oxygen supply, rented films, and in other ways strengthened the department.

Fire Chief Harry Krieger said about 40 prizes have been planned. Eldred Glaspey and his orchestra will furnish music.

Frame House Goes in Flames

COTTAGE GROVE — Flames destroyed a small frame house early Monday five miles east of here.

Fire Chief Ernest Shipley estimated the loss at \$3000. Shipley said the dwelling was nearly destroyed by the time Cottage Grove equipment arrived.

The house had been unoccupied since Saturday. It was owned by T. O. DeYon of Disston.

No reason for the blaze has been discovered. It was not known whether there was insurance.

COTTAGE GROVE — A 25-year-old woman who "blacked out" and was found lying unconscious along the bank of the Coast Fork River here was in "good" condition Tuesday at Cottage Grove Hospital.

Two motorists found Miss Lucille Wallace, 3871 E. Main St., Springfield, about 3:30 p.m. Monday. Her ankle was cut and she suffered from shock and exposure.

Chief of Police Ed Jones questioned Miss Wallace briefly Monday evening. Jones said she came by bus to Cottage Grove to look for an apartment. He said she remembered nothing after getting off the bus. She was found more than a mile from the depot.

Jones quoted Miss Wallace's father as stating his daughter has suffered several fainting spells in recent months.

The Springfield woman was discovered by Mr. and Mrs. Jack Fetter of Cottage Grove.

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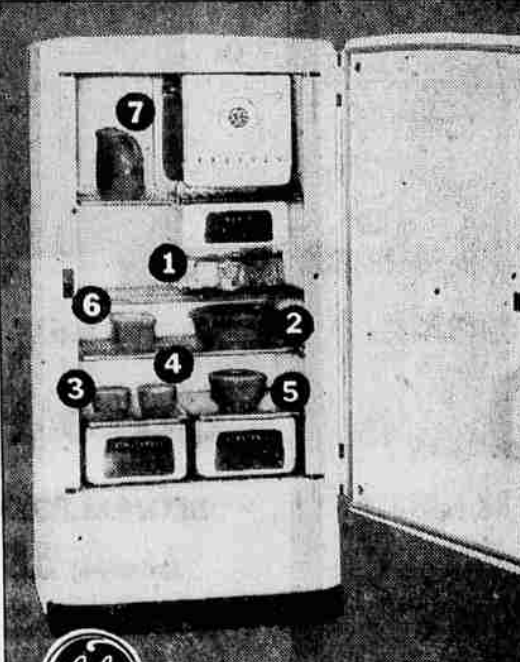
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
