

Stop Sign, Traffic Light Violations Crowd Eugene Police Court Docket

Laws pertaining to stop signs and traffic lights came in for a lot of discussion in Eugene's municipal court Friday.

City Finance Officers Henry F. Beistel, on the bench for vacationing Judge John L. Barber, Jr., dealt with a docket of 131 cases—49 of them based on stop sign or traffic light charges.

Bryce Gilmore Decker, Rt. 1, Creswell, pleaded not guilty to a stop sign violation for which he was ticketed last Saturday. But in discussing the incident with Beistel, Decker admitted that he hadn't seen a stop sign at an intersection leading into Highway 99 on the westside of town—and probably didn't make a full stop before crossing the highway.

Beistel, who was the city's regular police judge for several years after World War II, settled the case by ordering Decker's bail forfeited and warning him to make complete stops in the future.

Decker had been required to post \$200 bail because of two other stop sign violations on his traffic record for 1951. Ordering full forfeiture, Beistel noted that something needed to be done to impress Decker with the need for driving caution, "in order to protect your own life and those of others on the streets."

Another Friday case brought a reminder from the bench that mean-colored traffic lights mean "stop" and not "Hurry up to get through."

Robert Hubert, 360 N. 52nd St., Springfield, paid a \$15 fine for running a light at Franklin and Walnut Sts. on Thursday, and for violating a special driver's permit.

Hubert pleaded guilty and agreed with Beistel that his action might have resulted in an accident. The arresting officer testified that three children were already starting across the intersection when Hubert drove through against the light.

Captain Del Cash of the patrol division later noted that Eugene police officers have made more than 80 arrests this month for traffic light violations at Franklin and Walnut Sts.

Total bail forfeitures and fines in court Friday amounted to \$1524. Larry Floyd Brady, 541 Polk St., drew a \$75 fine for reckless driving. He pleaded not guilty, and when Acting Judge Beistel judged him guilty, Brady indicated that he would serve the equivalent of \$50 of his fine in jail. That would be 25 days.

Last Monday Beistel ordered two \$200 fines against Harvey Matt Johnson, Cottage Grove, following his pleas of guilty to driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor and driving with a revoked license. When Johnson indicated that he would serve out the fines, he was ordered jailed for 100 days, with an additional sentence of 100 days, suspended on condition of good behavior.

Monday's court session was abbreviated with only two other cases listed in addition to Johnson's. Following are the results of all Monday and Friday cases involving moving violations of the traffic code:

PRUETT'S SKY REVIEW

"I read a news item recently regarding a rainbow seen at night in Australia. It was news to me that this was news, for I have seen a nocturnal rainbow right here in our Yakima Valley." (A.D.H.)

The correspondent's description is that of a true lunar rainbow. In the interior states, a close observer of the night sky has a chance of seeing such once in about 30 years, according to Dr. W. J. Humphreys. In coastal areas, the chances are better. In parts of Hawaii where rainstorms are frequent, both solar and lunar rainbows are much more common.

Many believe the colored rings sometimes seen around the moon are rainbows. These are merely coronas or halos associated with thin clouds in stormless skies. Rainbows are allies of rainstorms and are seen in the opposite part of the sky from the moon.

For distinct night rainbows the moon must be nearly full and not very high. Since the light of the full moon is only about 1/500,000 that of sunlight, it is easily realized that all its possible luminosity is needed. But favorable to night rainbows is the fact that the sky is far darker and bows can be seen which could be detected at all in daylight.

For early evening rainbow production, raindrops must be falling west of the observer in order that refraction and reflection can properly return the
