2 Dying Girls Found in Snow

PONTIAC, Mich. — Two teen-aged girls who appeared to have been tossed from an automobile were found dying in a snow-bank early Tuesday.

Police said the deaths "look like murder," although they were unable to determine the cause of death immediately.

The girls, Jessica Anastos, 15, and Barbara Holloway, 17, attended a teen-agers' New Year's Eve party Monday night, police learned. However, other persons who attended the party told police they did not know who brought the girls or who left with them.

'Didn't Like Party'

Ernest McClaren, 22, a guest, said the girls left the party about 11 p.m.

"They said they didn't like the party and were going to hitchhike to another one," he said. "But I didn't see them leave."

Two youths from nearby Ferrisdale, Sam Harrell and Gerald Siefaff, told police of finding the girls in the snow drift a few yards from heavily-traveled Woodward Ave. By the time police arrived, Miss Holloway was dead and Miss Anastos was dying and unable to talk.

"She tried to tell us something, but all she could do was gurgle," a detective said.

Strangled

Physicians said both appeared to have been strangled, although there weren't marks of violence on their bodies and no broken bones.

Dr. I. C. Privette, deputy Oakland County coroner, said there was no indication of rape.

Their only clue, police said, was a report by Harrell and Siefaff that they saw a "tall, blond fellow" running from the scene when they stopped to investigate what they thought was an automobile accident.

DiSalle Expects To Hold Prices

Prediction Hinges On Steel Industry

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Price Stabilizer Michael DiSalle said Tuesday he hopes that ceiling prices can be held "reasonably" close to their present level throughout 1952.

He voiced the New Year's wish after his economists advised that, unless some higher authority turns the tables on DiSalle, the rise in the cost-of-living over the next year can be held to two or three per cent.

That would be slower climb than the 4.2 per cent rise in the cost-of-living since the general price freeze last January.

The OPS prediction is based on the assumption there will be no "substantial rise" in steel prices, the pattern-setter for the nation's economy.

That assumption hinges on whether Economic Stabilizer Roger L. Putnam and DiSalle can maintain their stand that the steel industry probably can absorb any wage increase that the United Steel Workers (CIO) may get.

Neither Putnam nor DiSalle believe the steel industry will be able to justify any "hardship" price boost as the result of a wage increase. They point to the industry's current high earnings to support this view.

Enemy Sub Or Porpoise?

TAIPEH, Formosa — (AP) — A U.S. destroyer depth-charged a supposedly hostile submarine in Formosa Channel Friday, a reliable source said Tuesday, but the target may have been only a porpoise.

Submarines and porpoises sound alike to a ship's listening devices. The source said the destroyer, believed to be the Higbee due in Hong Kong Wednesday, picked up on its sound equipment what appeared to be a submersible firing torpedoes.

It made four attacks, but there was no evidence of a kill—no oil on the water and no wreckage.

U.S. warships have been patrolling around Formosa since early in the Korean war when President Truman ordered the Seventh Fleet into the area to neutralize the waters between Red China and this nationalist Chinese headquarters island.

Lucy Anne Jones

Lucy Anne Jones, daughter of Oregon pioneers Louis and Catherine Strong, died Saturday, Dec. 29, 1950, at Myrtle Point. She was 83.

She was born near Grants Pass July 1, 1868, and was married to Edward Walter Jones June 5, 1887. He died six months ago.

Power Order Still in Force

SEATTLE — (AP) — The Defense Electric Power Administration order curtailing power in the Pacific Northwest will continue until at least Jan. 10.

The order was to have ended at midnight Monday.

James P. Fairman, DEPA administrator notified the Northwest Utilities Conference Monday, however, the order will remain in effect until the group's operating committee holds its scheduled Jan. 9-10 meeting.

The DEPA recently announced it would cancel the power curtailment order due to improve water conditions in the northwest.

Month's Fire Losses Light

COTTAGE GROVE — This city and surrounding rural fire district during December recorded one of the lowest fire loss records in recent years.

Cottage Grove fire damage totaled only \$115, according to Fire Chief Ernest C. Shipley. There was no loss in the rural fire district which is protected by city fire equipment.

Shipley said only nine fire alarms sounded during December. The two alarms that caused damage occurred in the city. Shipley said both were the result of carelessness.

One blaze was caused when a property owner set a box of "cold" ashes on the front porch. The other fire was started from clothes that ignited while resting on a dryer.
