

# Monmouth Girl receives Prize

Ann Louise Thompson, a senior music from Monmouth, has been awarded a two-term Standard Oil scholarship. Her selection was confirmed by Dr. William C. Dean, dean of administration. The scholarship, one of four given annually by Standard Oil of California to an outstanding member of each undergraduate class in the University of Oregon, was initially awarded this year to Anita Holmes of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. Miss Holmes has finished her university work. Two-thirds of the award will now go to Miss Thompson.

Miss Thompson has maintained one of the outstanding scholastic records in the university. She has won on the honor roll with 3.50 average point average or better every term she has been in music activities on the campus, and is a member of Phi Beta, national professional fraternity in music and drama.

# Music Education Conference Slated

The second annual Music Education Conference sponsored by the University of Oregon school of music has been scheduled for Jan. 18 and 19 on the university campus.

Guest speakers, including faculty members of the university's music school and educational administrators in the Eugene area, will discuss problems in music education. A special section will be devoted to problems in the junior high school and high school levels.

The program will open Jan. 18 at 4 p.m. with a discussion of musical problems by Glen Lockery, co-director of the University of Idaho School of Music. Concurrent with this will be a percussion clinic conducted by Charles Steele, instructor in music at Oregon.

Dean Theodore Kratt of Oregon's music school will serve as toastmaster at a banquet that evening at which Lockery will speak.

A concert will be presented at 8 p.m. Jan. 18 by the concert band and symphony orchestra of the university conducted by Robert Vagner and Edmund Cykler, respectively, and the University Singers, directed by Donald Allton.

Additional discussions will be held Saturday morning, Jan. 19, at which Russell Howland, head of instrumental music at Fresno State College, Fresno, Calif., and Lockery will be special guest speakers.

KUANTAN, Pahang, Malaya—(AP) — Rubber planters in this troubled area stand a good chance of getting shot—either by friend or foe.

Not long ago S. Peter James, a Ceylonese estate conductor, went out to chase off a herd of elephants. Sharpshooters of a Malay jungle squad, thinking that he might be a Red terrorist, shot him dead from ambush.

An investigation was ordered into this case, the latest in a series resulting from nervous security forces acting on the precept that in this kind of warfare it is better to shoot first and ask questions later.
