

Chamber Eyes Industry Survey

Committee to Try For Diversification

Members of the industry committee of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce adopted a resolution Wednesday evening to consider a survey of Lane County's industry, with an eye of gaining more diversification of the area's economy.

Members of the newly-appointed committee were told by J. W. Kipper, Chamber president, that the "Keep Eugene Ahead" campaign has revealed the public and Chamber members want to give priority to two projects:

- (1) Off-street parking;
- (2) Diversification of the area industry.

Sam Rodway is chairman of the industry committee. Other members are Bill Williams, vice chairman of the group; Lynn S. McCready, Charles Gillilan, A. F. Richards, Hugh Ford, Arthur M. Brooks, Jack O'Neil, Gordon Coleman, Milton Benesch, Fred Brunner, L. W. Trommlitz, Charles Fee, Wilbur Myers, Melvin Moore, Guy Lang, Dean Belstel, Ford Northrup, Wm. Trommerhausen, and John Gragg.

The group considered three phases of investigation: an overall summary done by a professional firm, a local statistical summary, or an investigation pointed toward attracting a particular industry.

Members of the committee suggested types of industry needed to round out the area's economy then voted to have a subcommittee make a study and report back to the committee prior to a recommendation to the Chamber's board of executives.

Nursing Class Set to Begin

Women are wanted to enroll in a new series of free Red Cross home nursing classes beginning next week. Mrs. Howard Boyd, home nursing chairman, reported this week.

Mrs. A. L. Oswalt will teach the evening classes each Tuesday and Thursday from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. There will be six or seven classes, and enrollment will be limited to ten. Classes will meet in the upstairs Red Cross rooms.

Teacher for the afternoon classes each Tuesday and Thursday from 2 to 4 p.m. will be Mrs. Donald Cron. Both teachers are registered nurses and have completed a special training course qualifying them as instructors.

Any woman may enroll in the courses by calling the Red Cross office, 4-5244.

Mrs. Boyd said also that an instructor is available in the Danebo area, and any organizations wishing to form a class, or individuals in that area, may contact her at 5-5361, or call Mrs. Guy Harman, organization chairman of the committee, at 5-2592.

The Danebo class may be taught in Danebo, or at Red Cross headquarters, as enrollees wish. Women interested should call one of the above numbers so that a class can be arranged.

Mrs. Boyd reported that several instructors are available for classes now, and suggested that any women's organizations wishing more information on forming a class call Mrs. Harman. The new instructors live in Eugene and other Lane County communities, and are willing to teach, she said. The course includes a new two-hour class on civil defense training, as well as the regular home nursing skills.

The bonds will be dated Mar. 1, 1952, and will be in denominations of \$1000, and will mature at the rate of \$2000 a year on Mar. 1, 1953 through 1962; and \$3000 a year, 1963 through 1971. Bonds maturing after Mar. 1, 1958, are subject to redemption.

Approval has been received from the U.S. Army Engineers to tie-in the new city sewer system with the federally owned sewage disposal plant.

Officials Signal Rules Tightening

Two county officials warned Thursday of an impending crackdown on building code violations. James Partridge, building inspector, and Howard Buford, county planning consultant, said builders have enjoyed a period of grace while check methods were worked out to administer amendments to the county's building code.

The crackdown will start Jan. 15, they warned. The amendments are expected to plug loopholes in the original building permit ordinances and codes, which outlined procedures but lacked adequate enforcement provisions.

New penalty clauses in the building code provide that septic tanks and sewage disposal fields must have approval of the county health department before backfilling. Inspection must be made within three days after the builder has notified the building department that the construction is ready for inspection. No residence may be occupied until this requirement is met. Failure to receive approval before occupancy will subject the occupant to a maximum fine of \$100 and/or 60 days in jail.

Each succeeding day of occupancy after notification of violation will be considered a fresh violation and subject the occupant to an additional fine or jail sentence.

Penalty for building without a permit will subject the builder to pay a building permit fee twice as great as would have been required before violation. Upon notification of violation the builder must cease construction and comply or each additional day will be considered a fresh violation.

Heretofore, the officials stated, builders, when apprehended for a violation, could plead forgetfulness and all would be forgiven. This will not be the case after Jan. 15, they warned.

Max Dudley, director of the Lane County division of the welfare commission, explained to the Lions that his organization's activities are strictly controlled by state legislation.

Many cases of need, he conceded, are outside the scope of the activities of the commission. Other activities are limited by budgets which were trimmed ten million by the last legislature.

Old Age Assistance
Dudley said the biggest part of the commission's budget goes to ward old age assistance, with the average monthly grant running at \$54. He emphasized that help to the aged is not a "pension," since it is granted only in case of need.

Aid to the blind and to dependent children and emergency "poor aid," are other activities of the commission. The Lane County division is supporting 72 dependent children in this county, he said.

Dudley said charges that the commission is heartless usually come from disgruntled applicants for help who are not eligible under the state laws.

Cut Kids' Fund
He expressed concern over action of the last legislature which cut \$10 million from the \$73 million proposed budget of the commission. Instead of reducing the budget in all departments the cuts were made in aid to the dependent children and "emergency poor" cases.

The old age assistance program wasn't touched, Dudley said, "because of political pressure."

He added: "Children don't vote. So their budget was cut."

Laws, Not Heartlessness, Limit Welfare Activities, Dudley Says

The Public Welfare Commission isn't "hardboiled and heartless" and neither does it pass out "barrels of money to anyone who asks for it," members of the Eugene Lions Club were told Wednesday noon.

SALEM—(AP)—Oregon counties were given \$2,230,264 in state highway funds Thursday. The amount is 19 per cent of the state highway revenues collected in the last three months of 1951. The money is distributed on the basis of the number of motor vehicles registered in each county.

Multnomah County received \$958, followed by Lane with \$783, and Marion with \$100.
