Why Be Date-Shy?

Are you too shy to glow at your beau-best on dates? Or are you one of the fortunate few, about 1 out of 10, who have so much poise that you can adjust to any situation and encourage others to feel comfortable, too?

Often, in Teen Etiquette forums, young people exchange ideas about how to build up date-confidence. Mostly, they agree: It takes the girl, the boy and her parents to give the date a smooth start.

"When I call for a date, on which we have agreed ahead, why should her family act surprised? Or asks Harry. 'If they do, I feel silly, like maybe I got mixed up on the time or am not welcome. It's better if the parents show that I'm expected and that it's okay with them. If they say 'Come on in, Harry; Mary will be ready in a minute,' I know I'm in."

"If the girl opens the door, first time you go to her house, she should not vanish before you get a chance to get your bearings. No, or nothing when you or your family try to talk, the girl gets nervous, for fear she'll be kidded, later, for picking a dumb date."

Easy Topics

For an easy start, you can always talk about school or sports or current events. Right after introductions, the boy is invited to sit down. It's friendly to pass candy or snacks but don't over-do the hospitality. "If the family makes too much fuss over me, getting me into father's favorite chair and bringing out the photos and all that, I wonder whether they are taking a light date too seriously," admits Steve.

"It's fine to have a boy say something nice about your house, first visit, but you don't want him to look around as if he were sizing up how much your family is worth," comments Karen.

What bothers me is how to get going, after some polite talk with the family," Ted says. Neither should feel shy about this. It is correct for either to suggest leaving, if it is understood ahead that they are going out, otherwise it should be the boy's idea. If the girl has tipped the family ahead, on date-plans plus when she will be home, this eliminates questions and come-home-early orders, at goodbye time.

Forget to Worry

"After a girl accepts an invitation, the boy should not start worrying about whether she likes him or really wants to go out with him," Fred believes.

Girls insist that they do not expect super-effort, on spending or entertainment. "The girl who expects too much from any nice fellow who asks for a date should be left out in the cold, AND WILL BE," Beth points out. "I mean the girl who is looking for the ideal boy, tall, handsome, with money, who just happens to be an athletic hero with all kinds of ideas about where to go and what to do. She's out of luck; there are not enough of those to go around. She's better off to encourage the shy fellow who might turn out to be the best date yet."

Know Finances

"The boy should figure out what to spend ahead," Bud figures. "If he's bargain-shopping, he should suggest where to go—a movie and a snack are enough of a treat any time. If he's really short on cash, he should find out ahead where he can take the girl for little or nothing, like to a church-social club party."

"Both should feel well-dressed enough to be able to forget appearance," Peg sums up. "You don't have to be a Rockefeller to make an impression if your clothes are clean, if you are neat in manners and speech, and if you try to keep your date from feeling shy."
