The Ducks captured the relay events, however, and with them the meet. Yosh Terada, Mill Kotoshiro, and Jim Allan gave Oregon its win in the 180-yard medley relay, while Henry Kaiura, Dave Houck, Harry Fuller, and Kotoshiro combined to form the winning 160-yard free style team.

Bob Gregson, a 15-year old freshman from Longview high school, grabbed individual honors for the meet with two firsts and one second. The young Aero Club tank star won the 100 yard breaststroke and the 200 yard freestyle and placed second in the 100 yard freestyle.

Actually Paulson has had more field goals than Christiansen, 14 to 13, but "The Gunnar" has 10 freethrows to only two for the Junction City forward. These are tops in both departments.

Floyd Burrigh, Springfield forward is eight points off the pace with 28. He is followed by Eugene's rapidly developing sophomore center Don Alnge, with 27, and Cottage Grove forward Wes Malcolm with 26.

Grove's Lowell Radway has missed the most freethrows, nine of 12 attempted. In the personal foul department, Radway, Eugene's Hank Hudspeth
