# Undelected District Rivals Play Tuesday

A quick showdown is due in District 6, Division 1 Tuesday night at Cottage Grove when the Grovers and Eugene settle first place honors.

Both teams have been victorious in their first District 6-1 starts, and the winner of this game will hold sole honors on first place. The Cottage Grove team, which boasts no man over six feet in height but makes up this disadvantage with an aggressive defense, has rolled up eight wins in 10 starts for the season.

The Axemen team, featuring sophomores, has won seven of 10 starts this season, including the last four in a row. Comparative scores indicate a close battle. Maury Kreutz's Grovers decided the University 37-28, while Eugene topped the Tiders 48-41. All of which means, Tuesday night's game will be another of many close ones due in the hot district race.

In the other District 6-1 contest Tuesday night, Springfield moves to Junction City. The Millers have yet to mark up a Division 1 win, while Junction City has won eight of nine contests. The Tigers, thus rate a shade edge in this contest.

In a March of Dimes benefit game at McArthur Court Tuesday night, Oakridge, the District 6-2 leader, moves against University in what should be an even cross-division contest. The Warriors loom as one of the top teams in the district, while University is also top-ranked but has failed to play up to expectations in its first two 6-1 starts.
