Two men were arrested in Eugene Sunday night and charged with driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor. Both were released after posting \$200 bail bond.

William Leonard Markham, 41, of 1040 Highway 99N, was taken into custody after a 5:10 p.m. accident at 10th and Pearl Sts. Officers reported that the collision did an estimated \$125 damages to the 1950 sedan he was driving and \$175 to a parked 1949 sedan belonging to Agnes Schottofer, 1922 Willamette.

Floyd S. Rutherford, 35, was arrested in downtown Eugene after officers noted his car moving in an erratic manner Sunday night. His car contained two bottles of beer, the officers reported.

Markham's car yielded an almost empty whiskey bottle and five cans of beer.

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Guilt Fixed
In Beer Case

With the conviction of 74-year-old Leo Wilbur Keller, officials hope to choke off what they claim is a major source of supply for beer-drinking minors.

Keller was found guilty of selling beer to a minor Monday morning in district court. This same transaction resulted in fines and a year's probation Tuesday for three juveniles and a fine for the March Field serviceman, Ray Alan Neptune, 19, who made the purchase.

Also in district court, Sidney Warren, 53, of Rt. 4, Eugene, changed his plea of not guilty to guilty on a charge of drawing a bank check on insufficient funds. He was placed on probation for six months.

James Harris, 30, of Dexter, entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of grand larceny. Bail was fixed at \$500 and a jail commitment issued. His preliminary hearing is set for Jan. 15, at 2:15 p.m.

Harris testified he was living with the complaining witness both before and after the alleged theft of the car. He said he thought the "whole thing had been settled."

Three residents of 1745 Bethel Drive pleaded guilty to being drunk on a public highway. They were meted identical \$40 fines. The men were: Clyde E. Johnson, 30; Frank Curtis Bose, 57; and Thomas Latta Allison, 58.

Roland A. Miller, 57, of Oakland, Ore., entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of disorderly conduct. He is committed to the county jail in lieu of \$250 bail and his trial is set for Jan. 24 at 1:30 p.m.

He is charged with entering a private house and refusing to leave when asked.

Walt G. Price, 31, of Phoenix was committed to jail in lieu of a \$155 fine for drunken driving. With the fine he was also given a 60-day suspended jail sentence.
