Gen. Collins States U.S. Tanks Are Superior to Russian Ones

FT. KNOX, Ky. — (U.P.) — Gen. J. Lawton Collins said Monday that American medium tanks in Korea "have defeated the Soviet mediums in every tank engagement to date."

The Army chief of staff said it was not generally understood why only light tanks were sent into Korea in the summer of 1950. But he said they were the only type it was practicable to keep in Japan with the occupation forces, and consequently American tank elements did not fare well until mediums could be brought into action.

"Since then, however, they have defeated the Soviet mediums in every tank engagement to date," he said.

He made this statement in a speech prepared for delivery before the United States Armored Assn. here. He said he did so to refute any notion that U. S. tanks are no match for the Russian tanks.

"Results obtained in Korea prove otherwise," he said.

Of the mediums, he said the "Patton" has proved "more than a match" for the Russian mediums, and the old World War II "Sherman" tanks have "held their own" with the enemy tanks thus far used.

With reference to new tanks, Collins said some serious deficiencies were found in the early models of the new light and medium tanks. But all, he added, "have been corrected in the vehicles now coming off the production lines."

Collins said the mediums are now being tested at Camp Irwin, Calif., and that the lights will soon undergo tests at Camp Drum, N. Y.

Bill Changes To Aid Vets Of Asia War

WASHINGTON — (U.P.) — The GI Bill of Rights appears headed for some changes this year as Congress considers proposals to extend its benefits to veterans of the Korean conflict.

Chairman Rankin (D-Mis) of the House Veterans Committee said Saturday hearings on such legislation will get underway Feb. 6.

So far the committee has under study 20 bills on the subject. Their principal theme: Give the Korean war veterans the same treatment accorded the men of World War II.

One of the measures—drafted by the American Legion—calls for marked changes, however, in the educational and training provisions of the servicemen's readjustment act.

And another along this same line will be introduced soon by Rep. Teague (D-Texas) on behalf of a special committee that has been investigating the Veterans Administration's handling of GI education and training.

Rankin told reporters he is confident Congress will act on behalf of the Korean veterans. But he steered clear of predicting what changes might be made in the act.

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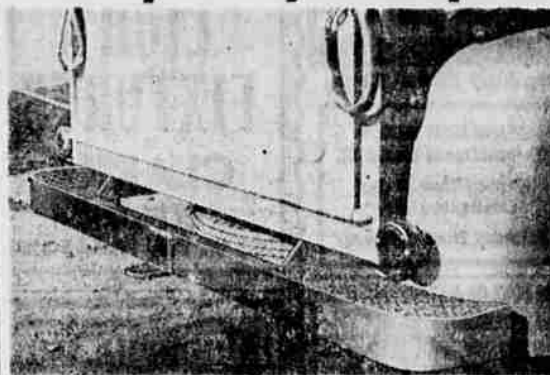
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Czechs Sentence Five

LONDON — (AP) — A Prague court sentenced five Czechs Saturday to death on charges of spying for the United States. This boosted to 130 the announced executions and death sentences behind the Iron Curtain since enactment of the U. S. Mutual Security Law.

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
