

Yoshida Raps Chinese Reds

Won't Sign Pact
With Mao Regime

TOKYO—(AP)—Premier Shigeru Yoshida said Wednesday Japan has no intention of signing a peace and trade treaty with Red China. But, he added, Japan is ready to sign a treaty with Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist government in Formosa as soon as legally possible.

Yoshida declared his government's China policy in a letter to U.S. State Department Adviser John Foster Dulles.

Scores Soviet Pact

"There are many reasons to believe," Yoshida wrote, "that the Communist regime in China is backing the Japan Communist party in its program of seeking violently to overthrow the constitutional system and the present government of Japan."

Furthermore, he said, the Sino-Soviet Mutual Assistance Treaty concluded in Moscow in 1950 is "virtually a military alliance aimed against Japan."

Reds Woo Nation

"In view of these considerations, I can assure you that the Japanese government has no intention to conclude a bilateral treaty with the Communist regime of China." Russia lately has sought to win Japan's favor with trade overtures. Reports circulated in Tokyo that Yoshida would send a special mission to Formosa to work out details for a treaty.

There was no immediate Nationalist comment but sources with a good grasp of official thinking attached importance to what they termed Japan's alignment with the free world forces opposing Communism.

Surviving are two sons, Atle and Chris, both of Eugene, and three grandchildren.

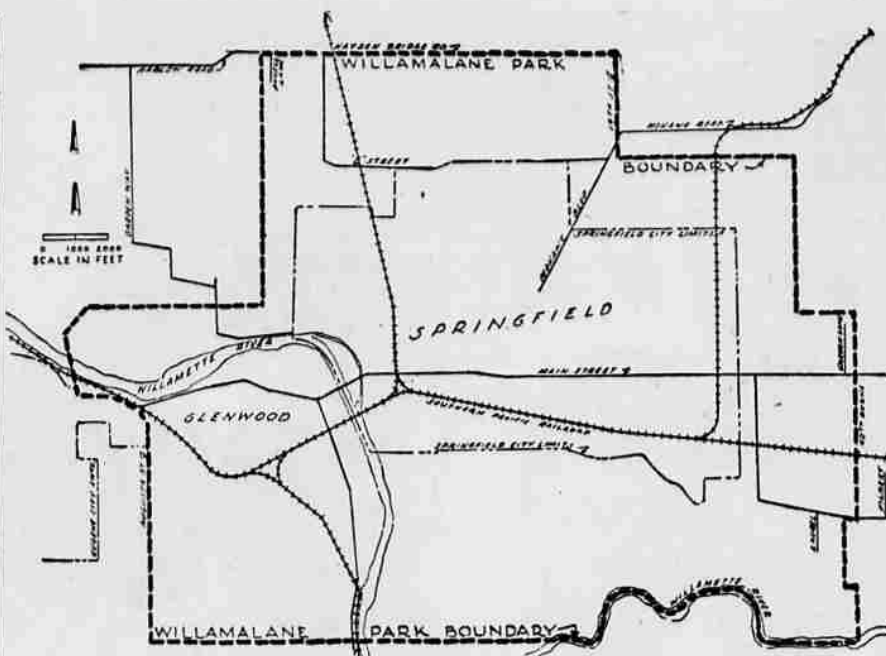

WILLAMALANE PARK AND RECREATION DISTRICT, Springfield, will hold a re-election Tuesday, Jan. 22, from 2 to 7 p.m. in Springfield Memorial Bldg. on its proposed \$85,000 bond issue. Registered voters living within the above defined boundary may vote. This map, prepared by the office of Howard Buford, Central Lane Planning Commission secretary, shows the boundary in heavy broken lines. Nearest roads to boundaries are indicated, for easy reference. The issue was defeated by 15 votes Dec. 18, 1951. If approved, the bonds would pay for district debts owed on its swimming pool and the Memorial Bldg., would pay costs of completing several projects, and according to district directors, would place the district on an economical basis. This would be possible, they say, because projects of the district could then be operated to maximum efficiency.

U.N. Casualty List Revealed

Total of 414,646
Injured in Korea

PARIS — (AP) — Casualties of United Nations and Republic of Korea forces in the Korean War have reached a total of 414,646 an Associated Press survey showed here Wednesday.

Delegations and governments were sources for the figures.

The most recent U.S. totals issued last week showed U.S. casualties mounted to 104,084 up to the first week in January. These included 15,950 killed, 75,374 wounded, and 12,160 missing or prisoners.

Totals for the armies, navies and Air Forces of 15 other U.N. member nations (excluding South Korea) were at least 8698, representing 1848 killed, 3528 wounded and 1822 missing and captured.

Movie Actress Sues To Divorce Designer

SANTA MONICA, Calif. — (AP)—Movie Actress Gene Tierney has sued for a divorce from Dress Designer Aeg Cassini. She alleges cruelty and asks for custody of their two children, Daria, 8, and Christina, 3.

The complaint, filed Tuesday, does not request alimony, but it states that the couple intend to work out a property settlement.

Klamath Sheriff Dies After Short Illness

KLAMATH FALLS — (AP)—Jack E. Franey, 53, Klamath County sheriff, died here Tuesday night after a short illness.

Franey, a Republican, was elected sheriff in 1948. For 13 years before that he was a sheriff's deputy.

He came to Klamath Falls 26 years ago from Illinois.

His widow and mother survive.

Kids' Escape Try Foiled

Two juveniles who gave their names as Richard Eugene Loux and Robert Dale Mistretta and their home town as Sacramento were being held by state police at Roseburg Wednesday.

Officers reported they had run away from Skipworth Juvenile Home—probably Tuesday morning—and had taken a Cadillac coupe belonging to F. D. Edwards of Springfield. The car was recovered at Drain.

The boys were originally picked up as runaways by state officers working out of Eugene. They had been held at Skipworth Home awaiting word from their parents.

Salem Honors Ex-Eugenean

Jason Lee, who practiced law in Eugene for two years after his graduation from the University of Oregon Law School in 1939, has been named Salem's junior first citizen.

Now an assistant in the state tax commission, Lee has been active in civic affairs in Salem. He is a distant relative of the Jason Lee who founded Willamette University in 1842, and who was one of the first city fathers of Salem.

After leaving Eugene he worked for the Department of Justice in Washington, D. C., and served four years in the Coast Guard in World War II. He returned to Salem in 1949.

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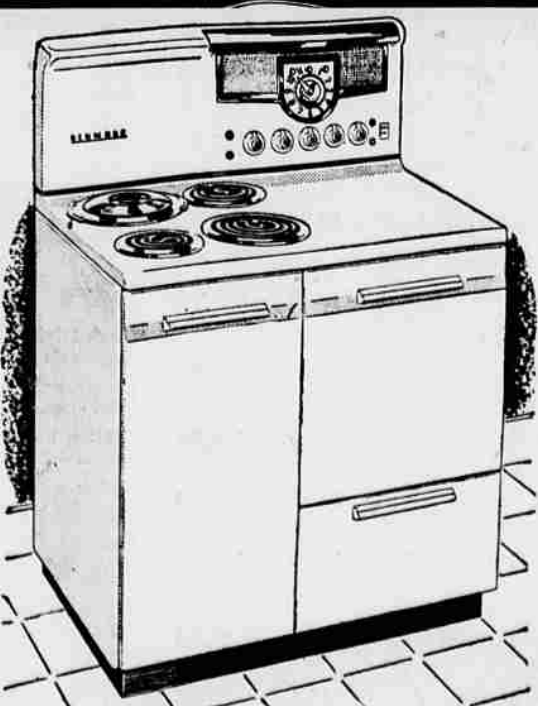
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
