

Reed Family Finds House

Burned-Out Folks Helped By Public

The Reed family, 12 of them, found a home Wednesday after a fire destroyed their former residence at 2268 Dakota St. Tuesday afternoon.

Erzel Reed, a logger, his wife and 10 children, were moving to Jasper Wednesday with the help of Willamette High School students, officials, and townspeople of the Eugene area.

ALTHOUGH THE fire destroyed everything they owned in the way of clothing and furnishings, Thursday morning the family had two truckloads of clothing and foodstuffs, all donated.

In addition, Willamette High students contributed \$53.35 in cash, and offers of furniture were rolling in.

The high school staff had found a house on Prairie Rd. for the family Wednesday, but the Reeds had already found one at Jasper near where Reed works.

Appeals broadcast over local radio stations brought in canned goods, good clothing, bedding and furniture.

BETHEL SCHOOL children took home slips of paper on which the burned out children's names were written so the right-size clothing could be contributed.

Tuesday night, the Red Cross gave a suit of clothes to each of the family and the Reeds spread out to stay with friends for the night.

The fire apparently started from an explosion in the back of the house, firemen said, and it burned in minutes. The family's 20-year-old Pekinese died in the flames.

New Hudson on Display In City Showroom Friday

The new Hudson Wasp, along with other 1952 Hudson models, will go on display in Eugene, Friday, at the showrooms of Bailey & Gilbertson, 971 Oak.

The new Wasp, a lower-priced running mate to the Hudson Hornet, is powered by a high-compression, H-127 six-cylinder engine. It has Hudson's exclusive "step-down" design with recessed floor and its low center of gravity, and Hudson-Aire Hardtop styling.

A 119-inch wheelbase makes the Wasp highly maneuverable. It boasts Hudson's rugged, Monobolt body-and-frame construction.

Simplicity of design of the Wasp's in-line, L-head engine offers low upkeep cost and economy of operation. Its H-127 engine delivers smooth performance at all speeds on regular gasoline.

Compression ratio is 7.2 to 1 with optional aluminum head and 6.7 to 1 with standard iron-alloy head.

The Wasp is available in six-passenger coupes, sedans, broughams, convertibles, and the Hudson Hollywood.

The massive front end of the new Hudson models has lower, wider lines that add to the car's hug-the-road look. The radiator ornament has been moved forward to further extend the sleek, low-sweeping hood lines.

Likewise, the back of the new Hudson has lower, road-hugging lines. The rear bumper has been moved downward.

Tail lights are set lower and blended into a continuous horizontal trim line.

The new Hudsons feature additional depth of trunk space with spare tire conveniently located in upright position for easy removal.

The huge, full-vision 951-3 square inch "wrap-around" rear window gives added range of visibility. Windshield has a surface area width of 59 inches for safe vision. Rear corner windows are larger and longer.

Offered as optional equipment for the first time is Solex Glass, a softly tinted safety glass which reduces glare and heat.

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West 11th Problems Top Of Meeting in February

Asserting "there is tangible evidence that this community wants to find a positive intelligent road to solving racial problems," Mrs. Robert D. Clark announced Thursday a public meeting will be held in February.

The February meeting will feature a panel on "What can this community do about improving race-relations," according to Mrs. Clark, chairman of the minorities committee of the League of Women Voters.

A "findings committee" of the League noted Thursday that "no group has been found which has the interest or authority to tackle the Negro problem" and that the league will sponsor the public meeting where all interested civic and social groups may attend.

"IT IS EXPECTED that from the personnel of this meeting will come the material for a 'Citizens' Council on Cultural Relations' which would be empowered to find the best avenues of action," said the league spokesman.

"Many individuals have expressed a desire to 'help in some way,'" Mrs. Clark said four groups have indicated an interest in the minority problem.

A report of the 'findings' committee included a recommendation that no group in this area plan to assist the Negroes in any way to get water on the West 11th Ave. property, either by drilling a well or piping city lines of water.

"THIS SEEMS to be a dead-end alley and would not have the support of either the Lane County Board of Health, the water board, or the Central Lane County Planning Commission," Mrs. Clark noted.

Since the problem of sewage disposal cannot be solved in that location where the land is hard clay with the water table too high for cesspools, the League's committee feels that any kind of assistance would only prolong the years of discomfort in an area where gardens, lawns, and plumbing are impossible.

"WE FURTHER recommend the possibility of relocating and integrating the eight families living in the West Eleventh Ave. settlement into our community," continued Mrs. Clark.

Since publication of stories in the Register-Guard a Glenwood woman has offered rental property to a Negro family.

Mrs. W. S. Baldinger, who headed the league's committee last year, observed Thursday that "The West 11th home owners voiced a unanimous opinion of complete cooperation with any group that might help their housing mistakes start over. While the investment they made in their lots, they are willing to add it all to a business deal if it gives them the chance to locate elsewhere."

The League authorized Robert Burtnett and Mrs. Clark to contact qualified persons for the panel discussion.

Responsibility of planning and informing all organizations of the city meeting was given to Williams, Mrs. Lou Reed, Mrs. Q. Breen, Miss B. Williams, and Miss Helen Breen. They will make arrangements for a suitable meeting place.

Justine Hammer and Mrs. Redmond will continue finding activities on the needs of the Negro families. Members of the committee include Mrs. Ralph C. Howard Russell, Mrs. W. S. Baldinger, and Miss Helen Breen.

"We believe some planning and intelligent action will unite our community, than divide it, we believe this area can be a prototype to live decently and peacefully regardless of race; and the league will help initiate any action which will help accomplish this goal."

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
