Lie Detector Use Stopped

WASHINGTON—(P)—Senator Wayne Morse (R-Ore.) said last week the Defense Department had notified him it had stopped using lie-detector tests on job applicants.

He told the Senate the practice was ended after he had protested to the Pentagon, and Defense Secretary Robert A. Lovett had made an investigation.

Wyland Quits Springfield Job

City Engineer G. P. Wyland has resigned from his Springfield post. He will leave for Seattle about Feb. 15.

Wyland said Saturday he will take a better paying job in Washington. He said the financial consideration as well as a desire to be closer to Seattle family members affected his decision. He had resigned last fall, but stayed on the job to train other personnel who took engineering posts after one of his staff members went to work for the county.

During the past year that Wyland served with the city, Springfield paved three miles of streets and installed considerable footage of sanitary and storm sewers, alleys, and sidewalks.

Morse denounced use of the polygraph machines as "repugnant, foreign and outrageous." He said other agencies besides the military also were using the tests. He said he was going to check on them, too, and that if they did not stop, he would introduce legislation designed to eliminate them.

The Atomic Energy Commission reportedly has used the tests at its Oak Ridge, Tenn., installation.

Morse said the Pentagon tests were voluntary and apparently used in determining whether a job applicant was a good security risk. But he said that at least one applicant, described only as "Mr. X," had the "reaction that it was voluntary in name only."

"He felt," the Senator said, "that if he didn't submit he would have one strike on him if, indeed, he hadn't already struck out."

Morse added that "Mr. X" was rejected for a job.

Members of the cast of the moving picture "Bend Of The River," photographed in Oregon, will be guests.

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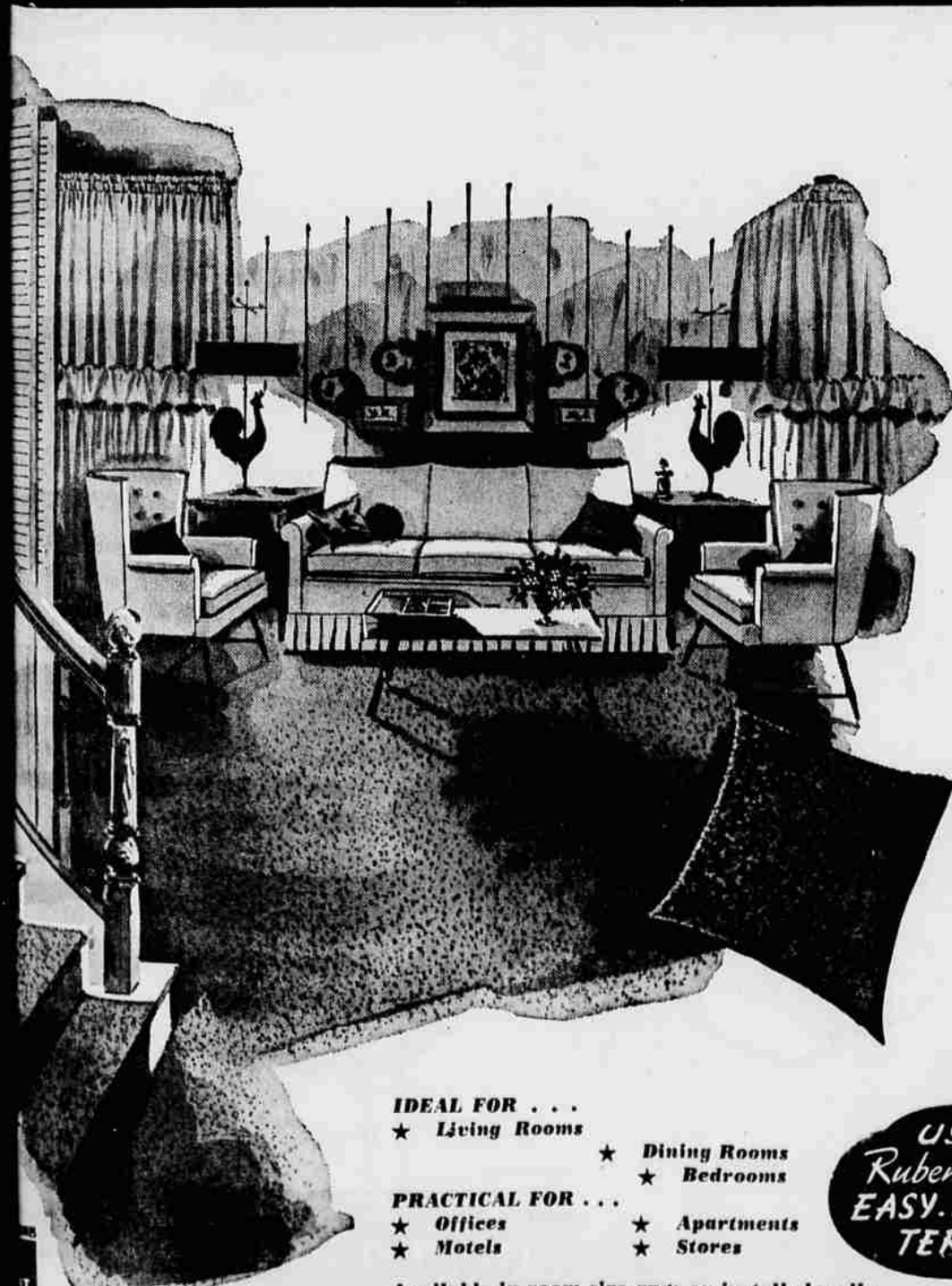
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
