

Parent Jailed for Negligence

Judge Sentences Father of Truant

A Springfield parent was sentenced to 10 days in Lane County Jail Tuesday and fined \$50 for failure to send his children to public schools.

The parent is Pierre Bogart, 791 St. Justice of the Peace Carl Lewis imposed sentence after that he said was repeated failure of the parent to comply with Oregon law, which makes it mandatory that children attend school until they reach 18 or complete 12 years of schooling.

Judge Lewis in October warned Bogart in court that he was in violation of law at that time. Tuesday the judge reprimanded Bogart again. He told the parent it is "criminal neglect to bring children into the world and then not take care of them."

A son who has been skipping school has been arrested for juvenile delinquency and petty larceny and other charges, the judge said. He said it is the first time he has knowledge that a parent has been sent to jail in this area under provisions of a 1951 law.

spoke of the "light globe and the electricity." He emphasized that the Buddhist thinks about the electricity which causes the light. He regards the bulb itself as only a detail, since "bulbs may come and bulbs may go."

Lao Tze, Confucius

Tuesday morning's discussions were devoted to the teachings of Lao Tze and Confucius, two Chinese philosophers who were approximately contemporary with Buddha. They were the founders of Taoism (pronounced Dow-ism) and Confucianism. Lecturing on the two leaders was Prof. Tatsumi with Swami Devatmananda leading the discussion period afterward.

Taoism, Prof. Tatsumi said, is a system of social ethics, stressing the virtues of being humble, content, unassuming and simple. It is a mystic religion, quiet and passive, with virtue attached to acceptance of what comes.

"Learnedness and cleverness," Prof. Tatsumi said the Taoist believes, "lead to much unhappiness." The Taoist learns to "Cast away learnedness and the people will profit 100-fold."

Five Virtues

Confucius taught that benevolence is the supreme virtue and the highest ideal of man, Professor Tatsumi said. This was added to by Mencius (an early Chinese philosopher) who advocated what Prof. Tatsumi called "rectitude." Later scholars added the virtues of politeness, knowledge and truthfulness. The five are known as "the five cardinal virtues."

In addition, he said, Confucianism teaches a code of relationships between lord and subject, father and son, husband and wife, elder and younger, and friend and friend. The most important of these, he said, is the code of conduct for relations between father and son.

Several times Prof. Tatsumi used Chinese words to express his exact meanings. Both days he lamented the inadequacy of translation, quoting an Italian proverb which says, "translators are traitors."

Fate and Wisdom

Tuesday afternoon Swami Devatmananda was to address a student assembly on "Fate and Wisdom." His talk was to be followed by a discussion and the showing of motion pictures on "The Sacred Dances of Hinduism." At this time Indian and Pakistani pastries will be served. The Swami will speak at 8 p.m. Tuesday on "Hinduism on the World of the Mid-Twentieth Century."

Wednesday the Parliament will turn to two religions of the Near East, both of which had more direct influence on European life. Speakers will be Bashir Ahmad Minto, president of the Moslem Society of the United States; and Rabbi Julius Nodel, of Temple Beth Israel in Portland.

Near East Beliefs

At 9 a.m. the two will speak on "Father Abraham" and "The Prophet Mohammed." Discussions will last until 11 a.m. At 1 p.m. each will speak again on the theology of his religion. And at 8 p.m. each will discuss the role of his faith in the mid-Twentieth Century.

Thursday, last day of the program, three speakers will discuss Christian faiths.

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MOST CASES SOLVED

Local Police Keep Lid On Winter Crime Surge

For mid-winter the major crime situation looked unusually rosy this week for police in Lane County.

With the Monday arrest of two youths (Story, Page One) Eugene police reported five major burglaries and a "promiscuous" shooting cleared. One of these cases, which involved the theft of nearly two dozen guns from Troch's Sporting Goods Shop, put the area's officers in a nervous sweat; they didn't know where or in what way the weapons might be used.

Crimes involving theft in one form or another traditionally increase during the winter, and police expect the total of unsolved cases to mount. Their hope is that they can "catch up" during the summer.

This winter things are better. Crime has increased, but arrests and convictions have nearly kept pace.

In Eugene only two major cases are unsolved—the armed robberies of Shisler's Grocery and of the Beaufort and Nasons Market. Elsewhere in the county a dozen and a half burglaries make up the outstanding cases; they were all committed in Glenwood, all apparently by the same man.

Bad check artists, too, are tripping themselves into jail unusually often. Deputy Sheriff Claude Romaine and City Detective Robert V. Mollett, who work as a team on most of these cases, have achieved a number of convictions, most of them resulting in two to six year sentences.

Last week one of the area's leading forgers, George Thompson, was given a six year jail term after passing 84 forged checks. This week two local men were before the local courts on bad check charges. They are Heston Joseph Robert Potter, 27, and Marlon Leon Leehr, 18, both of Eugene.

A big lift has been given out-of-county police units by local officers, too. An unusual number of "wanted" men have been picked up locally during the last several months. Latest in the series was the Tuesday morning arrest of Norman Alvin Adams by Woodrow Whetstone, Junction City officer, Adams is wanted by the sheriff of Umatilla County for obtaining money and property under false pretenses.

Dec. 20—James McAlpine Clark, 20, of Delwood, Ore., arrested by state police in Roseburg on information furnished by Eugene police. Clark now awaiting grand jury action on charges of armed robbery and beating of a Eugene tavern man.

Internal Tussles Beset Both Parties

From the looks of things Tuesday, Oregon was heading toward another hectic May primary, as both Democrats and Republicans continue to scrap among themselves about the way their national convention delegates would be instructed to vote.

The Democrats this time were scrapping the hardest — among themselves that is. The fight was between two of the many "wings" of the party in this state—the "Mahoney wing" and the "Sweetland wing." State Senator Thomas Mahoney, Portland, was still boosting General Dwight D. Eisenhower for President, even though the general has said he is a Republican. He filed petitions with the secretary of state last fall. The petitions asked that Ike be the state's Democratic nominee.

Meanwhile the Republicans, who caused the headlines two and four years ago in their primaries, have been quieter this year. Their contest appears to be between the two generals — Eisenhower and Douglas MacArthur. Gov. Douglas McKay is heading the slate of Eisenhower delegates, and Monday said he felt Ike would be an easy winner next May.

MacArthur's interests were being taken care of by F. E. Epton, Portland real estate man, who says he already has enough signatures to get his man on the ballot. He said he would file the signatures with Newbury unless he gets direct word from the general to file them in the waste-basket.

Taft Stays Out

As for Robert A. Taft, there appeared Monday to be little chance that his name would actually appear on the May ballots. Supreme Court Justice Walter L. Tooe, one of Taft's chief supporters, said he doesn't expect a slate of delegates to be entered for "Mr. Republican."

Taft forces, however, are not inactive. They were working to get "secondary support" from other delegates.

The law requires delegates to vote in convention for the people's choice, so long as he has a chance. Oregon has 18 Republican conference votes, and 12 Democratic votes.

He will speak Friday afternoon on "Practical procedures which enable principals to improve on the job," and on Saturday his address will be "How local action studies are helping Illinois principals improve their schools."

State leaders in education will attend the conference, which will center its attention on the "in-service" training of secondary school principals.

Other speakers on the two-day program include Dean W. Mickelwait of Eugene, president of OHS-SPA; Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction; and Joy Hills, directors of teacher education and certification. Dean William C. Jones, dean of administration in the University of Oregon will welcome the conference to the campus.

Donors should sign up at 8:30 that they may be ready. Hours will be 2 to 6 p.m. at Veterans Memorial Building.

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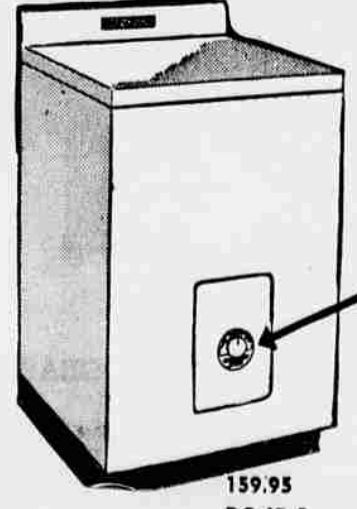
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
