Helicopter Removes
Bodies of 3 Airmen

PORTLAND, Ore. — A Coast Guard helicopter brought out the bodies of three airmen killed in the crash of a B-17 rescue plane in the Mt. Hood area Tuesday. The bodies were apparently killed when the plane crashed into a steep, wooded slope.

One of the five survivors of the B-17 crash on Tuesday were rescued by a helicopter after spending a day in the wind-swept and snow-covered mountain side, 25 miles southeast of here.

The Air Force identified the five survivors of the B-17 crash on Tuesday as: Capt. Stanley Lankiewicz, navigator, Milwaukee, Wis.; Sgt. Allan S. Ball, engineer, Alameda, Calif.; and Sgt. John A. Stangor, crew chief, Tille, Wash.

Men Accused of Kidnapping

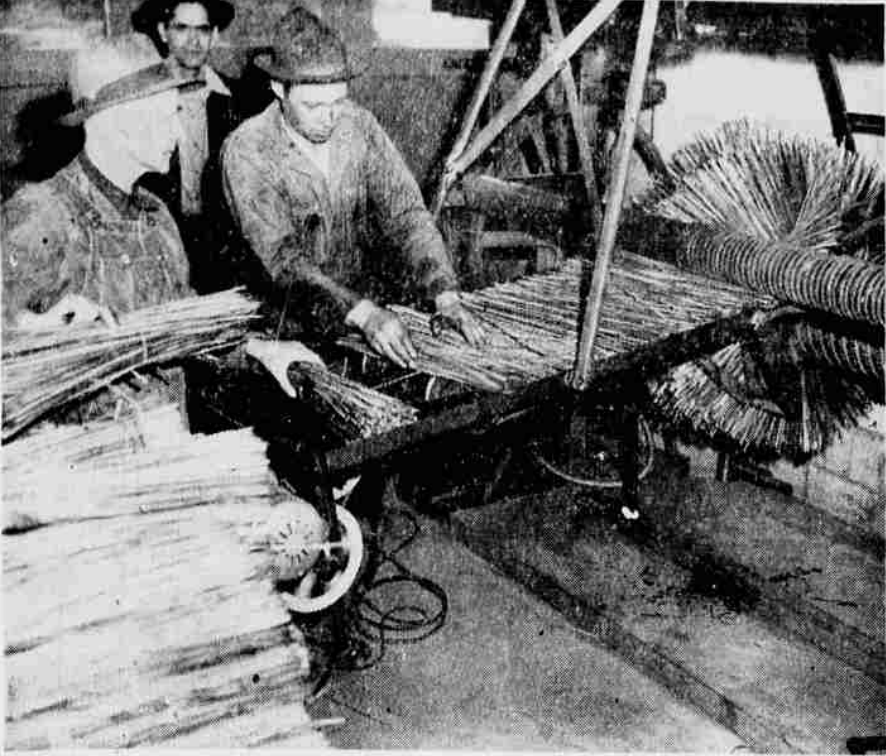

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\$163,000 Spent Every Minute

Budget Could Stretch
Eight Million Miles

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Every time clock ticks off a minute in the next fiscal year, the government would spend more than \$163,000 under President Truman's new budget—almost 10 million dollars an hour.

If you counted a dollar every second for eight hours a day, 40 hours a week, it would take you 11,416 years to do the job.

These are indications of the scope of the \$85,444,000,000 federal spending program the President proposed to Congress Monday for the year beginning next July 1. Anyway you look at it, it's big. Here are some other ways of looking at it:

The government would spend as much next fiscal year as it put out in the first 136 years of operations, from 1789 through 1925.

The budget is bigger than any two years' spending, put together, in the first five years after World War II.

If each dollar bill was laid out, end to end, the total would stretch for more than eight million miles, more than 240 times around the world at the equator.

It compares with \$9,183,000,000 spent in the year ending June 30, 1940, before the last defense program started federal spending rising rapidly.

Taft Denounces Truman Policy

BELOIT, Wis. — (AP) — President Truman's demands for a bi-partisan foreign policy, says Sen. Taft, are "pure hypocrisy."

The Ohio Republican senator, speaking Monday night on what he termed his presidential campaign "battle ground," said that Mr. Truman, since his reelection in 1948, has "thrown any idea of a bi-partisan foreign policy out the window."

Taft declared "the Korean war is a Truman war."

Taft's initial major speech in his bid for Wisconsin's 30 delegates to the Republican Presidential convention drew an enthusiastic crowd of 4660 to the Rocky County Women's Republican Club Lincoln Day dinner at the Beloit College Fieldhouse.

He said he attended a dinner at the home of Ring Lardner Jr., where he was asked if he would join the Communist Party. He said he did join.

Actors, Directors
Later, he said, he attended a series of meetings in the homes of Leo Townsend, Jay Corney and A. Polonsky. He added that he considered them Communist Party meetings.

Those who attended, he said, were mostly actors and directors. He said they included Larry Parks, Karen Morely, Gordon Kahn, Henry Myers, Ben Barzman, Morris Carnovsky, Sonda Corney, Paul Jarrico and George Glass.
