FOR THE DARING RESCUE under fire of two of his wounded comrades, Sgt. Lawrence Moots, 1850 I St., Springfield, Monday night was awarded the nation's third highest decoration, the Silver Star. Lt. K. E. Davis of Eugene, acting for Maj. Gen. Oliver P. Smith, commander of the First Marine Division, made the award at the Navy-Marine Training Center. In Nov., 1950, Moots watched two attempts to rescue two wounded men fail. Both times rescuers themselves were wounded. Then Moots dashed into the enemy fire, returning to safety with one of the men. And again he returned into no-man's land to get the other, successfully. The reservist was discharged last August.

Two Cottage Grove men were taken to Cottage Grove hospital Wednesday night following a head-on collision on Highway 99, one mile north of Creswell.

Erickson was treated at Cottage Grove hospital and released. The hospital said Blackwell, who received a fractured shoulder and scalp lacerations, is in good condition.

Bank Planning New Building

COTTAGE GROVE—The First National Bank here will build a new building at Fifth and Main Sts. as soon as government building restrictions are lifted.

This announcement was made this week by H. E. Eakin, vice-president. The bank has purchased property 77 by 105 feet for the building site. Adjacent property has also been acquired for parking facilities.

Eakin said plans for the new bank structure are now being formulated and that the building will be approximately twice the size of the present bank.

Security Nips Nine Dollars From Your Pay

Many January paychecks are going to be shy \$9, according to Claude E. Dawson, manager of the social security office in Eugene.

There may be a few lucky persons, however, who may find a little extra added to the total.

The trouble started way back in 1950 when Congress overhauled social security laws, making the different changes effective at different times.

The result was that a lot of bookkeepers got lost.

Formerly social security deductions were to be made only on the first \$3000 a person earned each year. The new law changed that to \$3600 for 1951.

Some bookkeepers forgot. The \$9 is 1 1/2 per cent tax on the \$600 difference. But several became completely baffled and went right on deducting after the limit was reached.

This situation must be corrected, Dawson explained, or the employee won't get full wage credit toward survival insurance and old age payments.
