

Oregon Chances For Kefauver Are Analyzed

crutted for a nation-wide campaign, although skeleton crews now exist in every state.

3. TIME. As a Senator-candidate, like Robert A. Taft, Kefauver can devote only part of his time to campaigning. Taft has said that Senate duties will prevent him from entering some primaries. Kefauver will face similar restraints.

The main problem at Kefauver headquarters insofar as the primary in Oregon (or anywhere else) is concerned will, of course, be where can he win? Meanwhile, Washington State Democrats on Capitol Hill privately were elated over Kefauver's bid for the nomination. They feel that party officials in the state are receptive to the Senator, and that he would be a strong candidate to head a ticket on which they themselves will be seeking office.

AS FOR WHITE HOUSE opposition to Kefauver, one of the Senator's close friends, who is a frequent White House caller, is confident that it comes only from the presidential retinue and not from Mr. Truman. The clique around the President, are believed to be seizing every chance to knife all potential Truman rivals in order to help force Mr. Truman to run again.

When Kefauver came out of his recent visit with Mr. Truman, he told reporters that he thought the President felt kindly toward him. Mr. Truman said some kind words in their 30-minute meeting when he told Kefauver that he thought he (Kefauver) showed more courage on civil rights than he (Truman) would probably have been able to show had he been Senator from Tennessee rather than President.

In short, pro-Kefauver Democrats believe that Mr. Truman will neither run nor direct a campaign to defeat the crime-busting Senator, and that Kefauver's candidacy must be taken seriously. It is the one they consider most likely to win the Democratic nomination.

Kefauver to Enter Primary in Ohio

WASHINGTON — (U.P.) — Sen. Estes Kefauver announced Saturday that he will enter the Ohio Democratic presidential primary against possible opposition from party members favoring President Truman's nomination.

The Tennessee Democrat, an avowed candidate for the nomination regardless of whether President Truman runs again, made his decision after a conference in Cincinnati with some of his supporters.

His move into Ohio came in the face of reports that pro-Truman Democrats plan to enter delegates in the election, May 6, pledged to former Sen. Robert L. Bulkley as a "favorite son." Bulkley would withdraw if the President seeks re-election.

Ohio will have 54 votes at the Democratic nominating convention to Chicago in July. Ohio is the third state in which Kefauver has announced he will enter a presidential primary. Already entered in Illinois, he plans to file in California.

German Dons U.S. Uniform

GOEPFINGEN, Germany (P) — In World War II Rudolf J. Kerl was a radar specialist in the German air force. He emigrated to the United States in October, 1949. A year later he was drafted into the U.S. Army.

Now he is back in Germany as a sergeant in the 28th Infantry Division and stationed here, less than 100 miles from his former home. His job in the American Army is radio maintenance. "The work is almost the same as I did in the German army," Kerl says. "But the pay is better—and life in the American Army is a lot better than in the German."

Kerl lived in Philadelphia, during his year in the U.S., and worked at a factory in Hattboro, Pa., making meters and gauges.

Marine Suffers For Outspoken Note on Truman

tion on the Armed Services unification issue.

The Soviet magazine, Literary Gazette, published a facsimile and Russian translation of Buuck's letter last August. Truman "to take the following issue to the people:

"Shall we pull out of Korea?" After warning the President that he would have to answer for "this sell-out," Buuck said, "Unfortunately, on account of you and your administration, most of the boys over here won't be alive to register their righteous wrath."

BUUCK ASKED the editor of the News-Sentinel to relay to Mr. Truman these questions: "How many years are you going to let American manpower, materials and money drain into this Korean sewer? How many more of my men must die on

account of your stubborn refusal to pull out of Korea?" In a note to the editor, Buuck said he thought the newspaper had a better chance of getting his message "to HST than I do."

But, he added, "do what you will with it... I had to sound off."

Supports MacArthur Completely, He Says

FORT WAYNE, Ind.—(U.P.)—Gale C. Buuck, former Marine lieutenant reprimanded by the Navy for criticizing President Truman, said Saturday he subscribes "completely" to the Korean war views of Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

Buuck refused to reveal the contents of the Navy's reprimand, which he said was signed by Undersecretary Francis P. Whitehair.

But he said it was "merely an official reprimand—the least punishment a Marine can get for doing something the Navy feels merited disciplinary action." Buuck said he could see "no point" in replying to the reprimand which he described as

"dull" and in the form of all such communications. "My whole line of thinking on the Korean situation is in complete agreement with Gen. MacArthur," Buuck said, and you can ditto me on anything he says."

The former Marine said he "very unhappy" that his criticism of President Truman was published in Moscow in the Soviet "Literary Gazette."

Says Stevenson to Run Only If Truman Won't

WASHINGTON—(P)—A prominent Illinois Democrat predicted Saturday that Gov. Adlai Stevenson "won't lift a finger" to seek the party's presidential nomination, but would accept it under two conditions.

Jacob M. Arvey, Democratic national committeeman from Illinois, said that, in his opinion, the governor would consent to be a White House candidate.

If President Truman announces he will not run again; and if, as Arvey put it, "there is an overwhelming and spontaneous demand by the leaders of the Democratic Party" that Stevenson be the nominee.

15 Migs Downed

SEOUL, Korea—(P)—Communist MIGs stayed in their Manchurian sanctuary Saturday after a week of spectacular U. S. Sabre jet aerial victories. The score: 15 MIGs shot down; no Sabres.

Van Fleet Lost In Korea Storm

SOMEWHERE IN KOREA—(U.P.)—For an uneasy hour Friday, U. S. 8th Army commander James A. Van Fleet was missing aboard a plane which was caught in a blizzard over United Nations front lines.

The general and his pilot, Capt. Brude O. Ihlenfeldt, of Lawton, Okla., took off from a front line division headquarters for another front line post despite threatening skies.

Fifteen minutes later a blizzard closed in. Visibility skidded to zero.

The pilot nosed down to 50 feet and through a combination of luck and skill, Ihlenfeldt located an abandoned hospital airstrip and made a successful emergency landing.

The general's aide, Col. F. T. Mildren, of Las Vegas, Nev., in a second light aircraft piloted by Lt. Wilbur R. Penypacker, of Lewiston, Pa., followed the first down to an emergency landing.

While Van Fleet and his party foot-slogged it through the drifts to the nearest road, his headquarters and staff chiefs were frantically telephoning front line sectors for information concerning his safety.

Elmira Woman Is Found Dead

An Elmira woman was found dead in the woods of her home at about noon Saturday.

Mrs. Bessie May Williams was found by her husband, according to the Lane County Coroner's office. Her death was apparently due to natural causes, but an autopsy will be held, probably Monday. A small laceration on the back of the woman's head was believed to have been caused when she fell backward, striking a beam.

She is survived by her husband, Daniel O., and a daughter, Mrs. Cedric Moffett, of Rt. 1, Junction City.

Services, in charge of Miller-Sherman-Murphy Funeral Home in Junction City, will be Wednesday at 2 p.m. in the Elmira Christian Church.

French Officials Visit Tunis in Peace Quest

TUNIS, Tunisia—(U.P.)—Two high French government officials arrived here Saturday night to study the possibility of opening negotiations for peace in Tunisia as the protectorate resettled into an uneasy quiet after 10 days of rioting in which 69 persons were killed.

Jacques Duhamel, attache to the French Cabinet, and Jean Lachou, foreign office expert on Tunisian affairs, conferred with Jean De Hauteclocque, resident general, immediately after their arrival.

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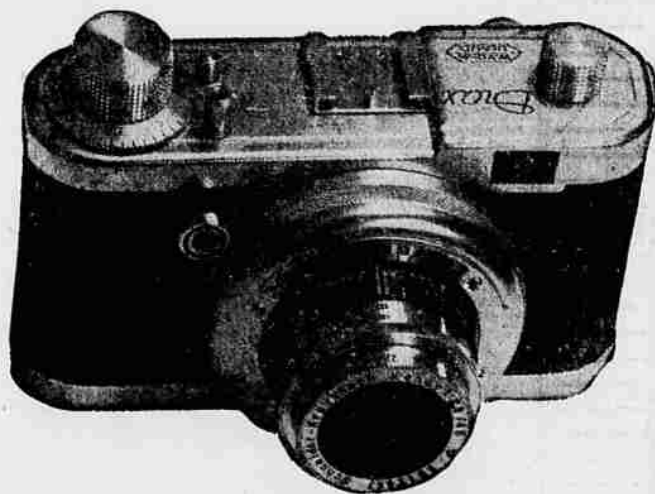
