

China's Trouble Began at Yalta, Nationalist UN Delegate Says

PARIS (AP)—Nationalist China's T. F. Tsiang said Saturday the whole postwar history of China and Korea would have been happier without the Yalta agreement and "the part played by President Roosevelt at Yalta is hard to explain or justify."

Chiang Kai-Shek's government accepted the Yalta agreement under United States pressure and signed a treaty of friendship with Russia which the Russians quickly broke, Tsiang told the United Nations political committee.

Presenting a resolution which in effect condemns Moscow for breaking the treaty, he said at the end of a two-hour speech:

"IN OTHER WORDS, in the struggle of the Chinese people for freedom, we ask of this great organization some measure of moral support and moral judgment."

He called the Yalta agreement—

which brought Russian into the war against Japan in return for concessions within China — "a great mistake, a disastrous mistake."

The agreement was reached by President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill and Prime Minister Stalin Feb. 11, 1945, at the Crimean resort city of Yalta, once a playground of the czars.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Jacob A. Malik who took a show of reading a book and newspapers and talking while Tsiang spoke, attacked Tsiang's charges as "lies and slander." Malik urged the committee to have nothing to do with what he called "this Kuomintang pettifoggery."

THE COMMITTEE adjourned debate until Monday. U. S. Delegate John Sherman Cooper, former Republican senator from Kentucky, is expected then to voice United States support for Tsiang's resolution.

Tsiang said one of President Roosevelt's main objectives at Yalta was to get the Soviet army into the war against Japan. He said Stalin demanded, as his price, rights and privileges in the port of Dalren, in the naval base at Port Arthur and on trunk railways of Manchuria.

Tsiang said Roosevelt was moved by fear the war with Japan might cost many more American lives if the Russians refused to take part and by hope that the Russians might behave as a loyal member of the U. N. and the great powers could achieve a long period of peace.

Youths to Try Christian 'Call'

CHICAGO (AP)—"Faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead." So said St. James in James 2:17. So also say a group of young folks who hope to get one million other young folks to become active, working Christians.

The project is known formally as The Call to United Christian Youth Action. Informally, it simply is "The Call."

It is sponsored by the United Christian Youth Movement UCYM. UCYM is the youth wing of the National Council of Churches, an inter-denominational agency serving 29 major U.S. protestant and eastern orthodox denominations.

The campaign will be at the climax stage during the next eight days. It will coincide with National Youth Week.

"D-for-dedication-Day" will be on Sunday, Feb. 3. Leaders expect one million young men and women, age 15 to 25 to answer "The Call" on that date.

They will pledge themselves, in effect, not only to have faith but also to work at it.

The project has five years in the planning phase for five years and in the organizing phase for one year.

Lobaugh Tells Kiwanis Ideals

"Things Kiwanians Do and Why They Do Them" was the topic used by Dean Lobaugh of Eugene this week in a talk before Springfield Kiwanis Club. Lobaugh, assistant superintendent of Eugene schools, spoke in Springfield Memorial Bldg.

Lobaugh said Kiwanis stands for helping the underprivileged, participation in youth programs, better citizen participation in civic affairs, for the primacy of spiritual values, business ethics, and improving fellowship.

The educator said service clubs foster better leadership and fellowship among men and women and through their humanitarian activity make the nation a better one.

Lots of Dogs Without Tags

Dog licenses for 1952 are on sale now at Eugene's City Hall, but the demand isn't what it should be.

The city finance office Saturday reported that only 100 tags have been sold whereas the local dog population is known to be around 1200 of licensing age.

If purchased before Mar. 1, the dog licenses will cost \$1.50 for males and spayed females, or \$3 for other females.

After Mar. 1, penalty fees of \$1 will be added to the price of each license.

Parts Prices Said Too High

Overcharging for vacuum cleaner parts by door-to-door salesmen has been reported to the Eugene Chamber of Commerce.

A complainant Saturday said that his wife had ordered a new filter for her tank-type cleaner at \$1.50. But before the salesman returned with the ordered part, her husband purchased one at a downtown store for 70 cents.

The chamber also was informed that some itinerant vacuum cleaner repairmen allegedly have punctured cleaner hoses, necessitating purchase of new hoses by the owners.
