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Eugene Man to Head County Campaign for Heart Money

PORTLAND—Appointment of Robert V. Cummins, Eugene, as chairman of the Oregon Heart Association 1952 fund raising campaign in Lane County, has been announced by H. G. Horn, state campaign chairman.

The campaign, to be conducted through the month of February, is sponsored, Horn said, by the Life Underwriters Assn. of Oregon.

Oregon's quota of the \$8 million goal nationally, is \$60,000. Seventy-five per cent of the funds collected in Oregon, will be allocated, according to Horn, for the purchase of new heart study equipment for the University of Oregon Medical school, and for clinical research and education and public service in the prevention and alleviation of heart ailments.

Statistics show that every year, heart diseases take a toll greater than the next five leading causes of death combined. Research made possible by the heart campaign, Horn said, is aimed at reducing the terrific heart ailment mortality.

Twenty-five per cent of the funds collected in Oregon will go to American Heart Association, Inc., with which the Oregon association is affiliated, for the national program of research and clinical service.

The month-long campaign, according to Horn, will be particularly emphasized during National Heart week, February 10-16. Contributions addressed simply to HEART, in care of the postmaster in any community, will reach their destination. Oregon campaign headquarters are at 230 Lumbermen building, Portland.

3 States Agree On Truck Pact

Idaho Governor Reports on Terms

BOISE—(AP)—Oregon, Washington and Idaho have agreed to truck reciprocity in principle, says Gov. Len Jordan, without relaxing the tax formula imposed by the 1951 legislature.

Jordan said the agreement reached over the week-end calls for full reciprocity on passenger cars and all trucks up to 26,000 pounds.

Both Idaho and Oregon will continue to collect their ton-mile tax, the governor said, and Idaho contract and common carriers will go on paying the Washington Public Service Commission fees.

IDAHO OWNERS of more than two vehicles over 26,000 pounds will pro-rate their mileage in the three states and license them in Oregon and Washington in proportion to the miles traveled in each state, the agreement stipulates.

Idaho will waive deposit of the \$20 prepaid highway use tax for out-of-state trucks, but will collect the mill levy use tax where applicable, he said.

JORDAN SAID a program whereby truckers paying the ton-mile tax in Idaho could pay a flat fee was being reached. Oregon's ton-mile tax exempts farmers operating trucks under 26,000 pounds.

Paul Vernon, Jordan's assistant in the negotiations, said further meetings will be held with Oregon and Washington officials. Jordan and Vernon will meet with law enforcement officials to discuss licensing of trucks over 26,000 pounds.

Youth Held For Albany

Eugene police Saturday afternoon arrested two youths who were wanted by Albany police. The two, Jerry L. Weber, 17, of Portland, and George F. Townsend, 18, of Detroit, Mich., were turned over to Albany police who charged them with burglarizing an Albany amusement company.

An Eugene police moved in after a chambermaid at a local hotel reported finding a discarded billfold in the wastebasket of a room, and a blackjack and several rolls of nickels in a dresser drawer. The rolls bore the name of the Albany firm.
