

BPW Members Participate In Program of Discussion

Instigating a new form of discussion program, at the suggestion of its state officers, Eugene Business and Professional Women's Club Thursday evening, at its monthly dinner and social meeting, heard a panel of six speakers from among its own membership. Four committees co-operated on the program: Public affairs, health and safety, education and vocation, and international relations.

Mrs. W. S. Nicholson presided during the dinner, conducting introductions of guests, and called on Mrs. E. C. Hall for a brief account of her recent trip to the Hawaiian Islands.

Mrs. Ralph Ketner, public affairs chairman, was program chairman, and announced the theme, "Strengthening America." First speaker was Mrs. Laura Sheetz, representing Mrs. Ketner's committee. She told what work could be done on local level toward this end: To support the Red Cross

blood bank, either by giving blood or by talking of it to others; to support the TB X-ray program; to support hospitals of the area; and most of all, to use the voting voice in local government.

DISCUSSING HEALTH AND SAFETY. Mrs. Max Burris was introduced by Miss Grace Robertson, committee chairman. She talked on the prevalence of accidents in the state, which is rated one of the 11 worst of the nation. Of pedestrian deaths, 37% are caused by jay-walking, she pointed out. The bad accident rating has been amasssed, she noted, in spite of the fact that Oregon has never known a major disaster.

Dr. Madeline Marr, school physician, reported on a meeting of the National American Public Health group in San Francisco, which she attended in December. She stressed the inter-cultural training necessary for successful public health work among the nations of the world, in order not to impinge on local traditions.

INTRODUCED BY Mrs. C. H. Michel, education chairman, Mrs. Harold Jensen, pharmacist, told the story of a new vitamin product which is being used successfully to combat alcoholism. It was developed through study and experiment by Roger Williams, former student at the University of Oregon and at Oregon State College, now a research chemist at the University of Texas, she related. An intensively concentrated product, it is marketed by the Lilly Pharmaceutical firm.

Mrs. Clarence McKee, chairman of international relations, introduced Miss Clara Nasholm, city librarian, to tell of the work of WHO, World Health Organization working under the United Nations. She gave the six most important of its 22 objectives, to be obtained through special agencies: To assist governments, on request, to strengthen their health organizations; improvement of diet, nutrition, housing and other environment hygiene; teaching maternal and child care; mental care; development of informed public opinion on public health. Outgrowth of some of these objectives, she said, include the greatest immunization program in history; 36 million children of the world tested for tuberculosis; a program of teaching African natives to spray with DDT against mosquitoes which cause deadly fevers, etc.

CLOSING THE PROGRAM was Mrs. Glenn S. Pirtle, Lane County manager for American Red Cross. She gave historical background of the Red Cross and told of its world-wide and diversified program. The Red Cross furnishes mobile trucks, at a cost of \$7000 each, to collect blood for the military program, she noted. It sent \$1 million to Korea, to purchase 250,000 yards of material for the women of Korea to sew into garments of the kind they are used to wearing. It paid for setting up a blood collection center in Japan, which has been of great help in providing blood for soldiers in Korea.

She told of the valuable work of the Junior Red Cross, by gifts sent to children of the ravaged countries of Europe, in building better relationships for the future. Many children of Europe, she said, had no conception of America, except that American aircraft bombed them once, until they received a packet and note from some American child, which led to a new friendship.

Octogenarians Set Schedule of Dates

The Eugene Octogenarians have begun to fill engagements again, after the passing of first tenor 'Cap' LeeRoy Woods.

On Thursday they entertained at the Rotarians' dinner at Woodburn with ten songs. It is reported that many compliments were bestowed on the singers by the 100 Rotary members present.

The Octogenarians never charge for their services but in many cases donations are made toward the purchase of music and also for making recordings, which will soon be on sale in music stores. Postcard-sized pictures of the group are sold by members to help defray expenses.

One of the Eugene singing dates will be on Lincoln's birthday at the potluck dinner in the IOOF dining-room for Odd Fellows and Rebekahs, with other branches of the order invited.

The president of the group is Frank I. Terpin, 85, who handles the heavy end of the line; Manager is Rev. Frank L. Cook, 86, baritone; George N. McLean, 84, second tenor, and John H. Starr, 82, secretary and first tenor.

Good Lighting Protects Makeup Application

Lamps of the dressing table should provide the proper light at the proper angle for most efficiency — poor lighting conditions can create weird effects with a woman's makeup.

One vanity lamp on each side of the table, with 36 inches between them, and six inches away from the wall. Height should be 15-16 inches at the center of the shade. White, pale ivory or champagne are the safest color choices. Diameter of the shade should be at least nine inches at the bottom and depth should be seven inches. The standard 100-watt light bulb is satisfactory, or for a variation of light, a 30, 70 or three-way frosted bulb can be used.

Recipe

APRICOT LEMON SHERBET

Ingredients: 2 1/4 cups apricot fruit nectar, 3/4 cup sugar, 1 envelope unflavored gelatin, 3/4 cup water, 1/4 cup lemon juice, 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind, dash of salt.

Method: Put nectar and sugar in a saucepan and stirring until sugar is dissolved heat until boiling. Soften gelatin in 1/4 cup of water and dissolve in hot nectar; mix in remaining water, lemon juice, rind, and salt. Pour into refrigerator tray and place in freezing compartment with control set at lowest temperature. Freeze to mush consistency. Turn into chilled bowl and beat with rotary beater until light and fluffy. Return to refrigerator tray in freezing compartment and freeze until firm. Reset temperature control to normal. Makes about 1 quart.
