SAUSAGE AND SQUASH
Acorn squash, filled with bulk sausage, makes a main course pleasing to both palate and pocketbook.

Ingredients: 2 acorn squash or 1 small-sized winter squash, salt and pepper, and 1 pound bulk sausage.
Method: Cut acorn squash in halves or winter squash into four pieces and remove seeds and stringy portion. Cut slashes in the squash to the rind, and sprinkle cut surface with salt and pepper. Shape sausage into 8 thin patties and place in hollows of squash. Put squash in shallow baking pan, add hot water to the depth of 1/4 inch. Bake in a hot oven (375 degrees to 400 degrees F.) 50 to 60 minutes, or until the squash is soft. Turn sausages once during cooking to insure thorough heating.

Mothers March for Polio Thursday to Engage 1000

More than 1000 women will be walking in the Mothers' March for Polio, it is estimated by co-chairmen, Mrs. David M. Campbell and Mrs. Michael Burke. At an organizational meeting Monday evening in the administration office of School District 4, more than 60 women, representing various organizations taking part, were present for final instructions.

Eugene has been chosen as one of the cities to report by telegram directly the hour's march is completed, to the New York headquarters in the March of Dimes campaign. Actress Helen Hayes will be broadcasting results of the Mothers' March from states all over the nation, and will announce what Eugene has given.

Each woman is signed to walk her own block, calling on homes where the porch light is burning. Signals will sound at 6:30 p.m., telling homeowners when to turn on lights. Those having no porch light may burn a candle in the window, set a flashlight there, or contrive some similar signal.

WHISTLES of Weyerhaeuser and Giustina Lbr. Co. mills and of the Eugene Fruit Growers plant are to sound, and auto horns will be sounded all over the city to make a volume of sound which cannot be missed. Children have been asked to sound the horns.

To insure against any emergency or accident, the office of the Lane County Chapter of American Red Cross will be kept open during the hour-long march, it is announced.

If any house is missed, the homeowner may telephone the First National Bank, where a

crew will be maintained to make special calls by car.

EACH WOMAN walking will carry a jar or receptacle to receive coins, which will be turned over to each district captain, numbering 22. As soon as the hour is up, police squad cars will call at the homes of the captains to collect the money. Members of the sheriff's force will make collections in outlying districts.

Women's service groups will cover the hotels, where patrons will have been advised to hang a shoe, handkerchief or towel on the doorknob if they wish to make a contribution to the fund, in order that canvassers may know whether to knock upon the door. Other women's groups will call at moving picture theaters, the leading apartment houses, and other parts of the downtown area.

BANNERS WILL appear in Eugene stores Thursday morning, reminding the public: "Fight Polio Tonight! Turn on Your Porch-light!" They will be distributed Wednesday by members of the service group of Girls League of Eugene High School.

This is to be the final clean-up in the polio campaign, it is stated. No solicitation is to be made following Jan. 31, by present plans.
