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PRIVATE COMPLAINT FILED

Court Fines 148 Drivers

A complaint filed by a private citizen against a University of Oregon truck driver cost the driver a \$25 fine in Eugene Municipal Court Wednesday night.

O. C. Brown, 222 N. 19th St., Springfield, charged C. D. Collingwood, 1907 Arthur St., the truck driver, with violation of the basic rule in connection with a minor accident at the corner of 19th and Hilyard St.

Brown testified that Collingwood drove up alongside his car while he was parked at a traffic light, scraping the right side of his car with the truck bed. Damages amounted to \$52, Brown added.

Collingwood said he thought that there was room between the Brown car and the curb for him to drive through. He was planning to make a right turn at the intersection.

IN ASSESSING the fine, Judge John Barber admonished Collingwood for using "bad judgment" and for not taking the time to wait behind Brown until the light had changed.

Judge Barber fined Paul Everett Riley, 984 Chambers St., \$5 for "squirreling" and tossed in a lecture on what he termed "foolish and dangerous" driving. Riley was charged with "digging out" from a stop light on a night when streets were in poor driving condition, rapidly stepping up his speed to 35 miles an hour in second gear.

Another youthful driver, Frank Neil Chase, of Rt. 2, Box 90, drew a \$10 fine for speeding on the Ferry St. overpass. Judge Barber remarked that he was "glad to see the police department enforcing the law on this stretch of road."

Candidate Balks At Pledging Vote To GOP Winner

PORTLAND—(U.P.)—Robert A. Bennett broke a 32-year-old tradition Wednesday when he filed his declaration as a candidate for delegate to the Republican national convention—he refused to pledge his support to the winner of the Oregon presidential preferential primary.

The Portland attorney said he would file a petition at Salem in his own behalf, a method which is unusual but legal in Oregon.

"I have not declared myself for any candidate . . . I am open to conviction as to who is the best man for the Republicans to nominate," Bennett said.
