

Plywood Prices To Get Ceilings

OPS Says Current
Rates Below Limit

Ceiling prices will be applied to plywoods in Western states next Monday, but there will probably be no noticeable effect on the market.

Carl Donough, district director of the Office of Price Stabilization in Portland, said all the ceilings are higher than current market prices.

The most popular industry product, quarter-inch fir plywood for interior use, currently is selling at the mill for 8.2 cents to 8.3 cents a square foot. The ceiling level at the mill will be 9.7 cents.

DONAUGH EXPLAINED that the ceilings will be applied to direct mill sales of standard grades. The regulation (OPS No. 122) takes into consideration soundness of the product, kind of wood, and whether it is treated for inside or outside use.

About 80 mills, all west of the Rocky Mountains, are affected. Fir, hemlock, pine, cedar and redwood plywood will be covered. Donough said details are being sent to the industry and to Chambers of Commerce.

Ceilings on less than carload lots will be 10 per cent higher than on carload lots. The regulation defines a direct mill sale as one which originates at the producer's mill, no matter whether the seller is a mill operator, wholesaler, retailer, or distributor.

VENEER termed "technical plywood" which must meet special requirements of the Armed Forces is not governed by the order. Softwood plywood with one or more plies of hardwood veneer is also outside the ceiling regulation.

The ceilings per 1000 square feet, f.o.b. mills, for sales in carload lots of some of the major grades and dimensions of plywood, and Douglas fir veneer follow:

Douglas fir plywood—Sound on two sides, ranging from \$124 to \$266; sound, one side, ranging from \$97 to \$239 depending on the thickness and number of plies.

Douglas fir, western pine, western hemlock plywood: unsanded interior sheathing, 5-16ths of an inch, 3 ply, \$79; interior sheathing, 5-8th inch, 5 ply, \$138.

Douglas fir green veneer—one-tenth inch, face \$30.30, core, \$10.10; 1-8th inch, face, \$36, core, \$12; one-sixth inch, core, \$18; 3-16th inch, core, \$16; 3-16ths inch, core, \$18.50; and 1-5th inch, core, \$19.70.

Eva Gallup Hearing Set

Policewoman's Firing
To Be Reviewed

A hearing on the dismissal of Eugene's veteran police matron has been set for Friday evening, Feb. 8, in the municipal courtrooms.

Eva Gallup, police matron here under four chiefs of police during the past ten years, was dismissed for insubordination, it was announced Tuesday, by City Manager Oren King.

She could not be contacted by telephone for a statement Thursday morning. The hearing will be held before the Eugene Civil Service Board, composed of three men, Arthur Hendershott, Maxwell Morris, and J. D. Barnett. It will start at 7:30 p. m.

The matron was dismissed when she reportedly refused to accept duties in the headquarters filing section in addition to her duties as matron, King said. Her regular duties included caring for women prisoners and juveniles in custody, and checking amusement places and other centers where women and juveniles may gather.

City firemen and most city policemen are under the city civil service system, and may apply for a hearing before the board when dismissed.

Grass Roots Contact Needed With Europe, Minister Says

It would be good if the United States could provide funds to send 10,000 "common people" to Europe every year to mix with the citizens of those countries, members of the Eugene Lions Club were told Wednesday noon.

Dr. Wesley Goodson Nicholson, minister of the First Congrega-

tional Church in Eugene, made the suggestion. After visiting Europe last summer, he came home with the impression that most people there feel the United States is a land of wealthy inhabitants interested only in finding more conveniences.

Most tourists, he said, add to the average European's idea of America as a land of shallow tastes and bulging pockets.

He was surprised to find the word "Coca-Cola" used by one Italian as a slang expression for "no good." Many Europeans, he found, used Coca-Cola as a symbol of our civilization. He interpreted their meaning to be that people here are interested chiefly in manufacturing and advertising things which make life more comfortable and convenient.

People argued that "by centering our attention on comforts," the Nicholson said, "we are missing the deeper values of life."

He said he felt both the United States and Europe would benefit if more average Americans could visit European countries to really mingle and talk with the natives.
